Standard is swabbing Marble Lease No. 6, important key well on the northwest corner of the property. The well came in temporarily without

The Chanslor-Canfield Midway Oil company is ready to ball Del Amo No. 12 for a water test. The well was cemented at 3000 feet, it is located "way out west" on the old Redondo road, offsetting Standard's Ellinwood No. 1.

The Shell Oil company has drilled Bleumle No. 1 to 2285 feet.

The Shell office in the local field has had charge of Reyes No. 2, the wild well of Dominguez Hill. For three days this well spouted oil and gas over most of the adjacent country-The gas was roaring out at a rate of 20,000,000 cubic feet a day.
The oil flow was estimated at 4500 barrels. The company pumped 330 pounds of cement, sawdust and rope into the tubing, but failed to check Thursday the well sanded up and stopped gushing.

is back on production, having made 736 barrels in the first 20 hours of its renewed flow.

Standard's Kettler No. 1 is making 00 barrels a day, about half of which s mud and water.

Shell's eastern outpost, Dolores No. I, formerly Weston No. 1, east of Harbor boulevard, has been drilled to

The C.-C. M. O. has located Kettler 20, 21 and 22 on the Kettler lease. They are center line wells.

Shell is getting down with Kettler No. 10, located not far north of Standard's Kettler No. 1 in Lømita. In view of Standard's tough luck with Rettler No. 1, the Shell well is being watched with interest. It is down 3110 feet.

Torrance No. 13 of the Superior Oil company is off production, after hav-ing made 130 barrels of 20 gravity clean oil on the pump. Selby and Root have erected a new rig on the brick plant lease, not far south of Superior's 13 and Mohawk's wet well.

"Nothing new" tells the story of Shell's Keystone No. 1, at which the crew is still making mechanical changes.

The Santa Fe has seven wells near The Santa Fe has seven wells near completion. Kettler No. 11 is being drilled in; No. 16 has received a water shutoff O. K.; No. 13 and No. 3 are being whished out, prior to swabbing. The first producer on the second tier of wells on the Torrance lease, north of the old Redondo road, will be in soon. No. 42 and No. 50 are standing cemented. No. 42, second tier well, south of Carson street, is being drilled in the oil sand.

The Standard Oil company has located Marble Lease No. 12 on the northeast corner of the property.

Bernard Le Mohn has located an offset to Standard's Dominguez No. 4.
