O. W. Hines of Fullerton, formerly

O. W. Hines of Fullerton, formerly of Detroit, who recently made an industrial survey of Southern California for eastern industries, asserted that goods can be fabricated here from 15 to 33 per cent cheaper than in the east. Climate, low labor turnover, transportation, power combine to lower manufacturing costs here, he explained.

Big Freight Bill

"Southern California," he said, "paid
\$12,000,000 for freight on automobiles
in 1923. The freight bill on the automobiles now owned in this state
amounts to \$110,000,000. Automobiles
can be built here from 12 to 15 per
cent cheaper than in the east."

Walter Thornton of Fullerton issued a powerful exhortation for community co-operation in the industrial
movement.

"Southern California," he said, "is destined to become the center of population of the world. Two-thirds of the linhabitants of the globe live in countries fronting on the Pacific. That gives Southern California a market of 1,133,000,000 people. With this condition existing Southern California will be a great industrial center, even if we do not encourage new industries to locate here. But by this movement we can bring about in four or five years what will, in the four or five years what whi, in the natural course of events, take plac
