No, says East. All the art and science known, driven by the stalking dread of food shortage, won't be able to stretch the crops of the exhausted soil.

"The fattest lands of the earth before then will be drained of their fertility," declared the professor the other day. "All the new soils will be used up, and the teeming billions of the world will face a hungry end. The famines of China will be familiar in the corn belt of America.

"Mechanical invention, by vastly enlarging the food return per unit of man power without noticeably raising the revenut per unit of area, has merely served to shorten the time when the earth as a whole will be saturated with people.
