Two new wells went on production in the field Thursday—the Petroleum Securities company's Marble No. 21 and the Sentinel Oil company's Joughlin No. 6. The Doherty producer, an inside well on the Marble property, is making 1000 barrels a day. It was completed at 2750 feet. Joughlin No. 6 is a 490-barrel well, having been drilled to 3832 feet. The Sentinel completed gives this company six good producers in the Joughlin property.
