HEAT, LIGHT AND ELECTRICAL MEDICAL APPARATUS NOW AT DISPOSAL OF TORRANCE PUBLIC

In order to provide the most modern scientific equipment at the disposal of the public in this district, Doctors J. S. Lancaster and George P. Shidler have installed in their Torrance office in the First National Bank building a quantity of new apparatus. The equipment consists of the most modern X-ray and fleuroscope available, two quartz lamps, a large and modern electrical apparatus for purposes of diathermy (electrical treatment), and a large heat penetration lamp for deep therapy.

The fleuroscope will enable the physicians to perform important X-ray work without having to develop films. It is large enough to permit of an X-ray of a large portion of the human anatomy.

The electrical apparatus for purposes of diathermy and auto-condensation permits of electrical treatment by the use of heavy alternating currents, and has proven to be of inestimable value in the treatment of many aliments, especially inflammations and infections.

The two quartz lamps are so constructed that they direct ultra-violet rays of light at parts to be treated. One is small, for purposes of local infections. The other is large, for treatment of greater areas. The ultra-violet ray has been found by the medical profession to be of value in the treatment of skin lesions and even of tuberculosis. of tuberculosis.

Science, during recent years, has learned much about the ultra-violet ray. When bright light passes through quartz these rays are pro-jected. When light passes through glass the ultra-violet rays are absorbed. The acquisition of this modern

equipment in Torrance places at the disposal of the public the latest acdisposal of the state of the st by electrical current, heat, and seg-regated light rays.

The fleuroscope is of unusual value for purposes of accurate diagnosis, probably the most important phase of medical science.
