"The directors of the Chamber of Commerce," said Mr. Gilbert, "certainly would not countenance a menace and I believe their resolution must have been passed without receiving the consideration it deserves."

Mayor Smith assured the audience that the proposition would receive the most careful consideration at the hands of the board.
