THE greatest speed-demons in the world went out on the track at Indianapolis Memorial Day to race for 500 miles. Every one of them knew the danger in racing at a speed of almost 100 miles an hour for a distance that brings terrific strain on an automobile. A calm, smiling man was referee of the event. He knew the danger to the drivers. But with a consideration characteristic of the man, he had done what he could about it. The drivers did not know it until the race was over. But the referee had personally insured every one of the drivers for \$10,000 against acident. A pretty fair referee that—Henry Ford.

THERE has been much international sportsmanship—and lack of it—to comment on during the pāst monti. The latest event has to do with Stuart McClaren, British aviator, whose plane crashed down in India and temporarily put him out of the air race around the world. It has to do with this British aviator and the United States navy. And it ought to make every American's chest puff out with pride.

McClaren had a spare plane 300 miles from the place at which his traveling plane was injured beyond repair.

Immediately officers of the American navy, with the officials' sanction at Washington, cabled McClaren that an American gunboat would be only too happy to transport his spare plane to the scene of the crash, thus enabling the British aviator to continue his flight.

McClaren accepted the offer with the following cabled comment: "Hats off to the Stars and Stripes for sportsmanship."

Now isn't that great stuff?

THERE will be more excitement at the Republican convention in Cleveland than has been generally anticipated. Which is by way of introducing you to Dr. Marion Leroy Burton, president of the University of Michigan, doctor of divinity, doctor of philosophy, practical idealist, demon, for accomplishment, and probably one of the few really great orators in the United States today.

Dr. Burton wy deem it a bit bremature to announce

who has sat enthraised by the marvelously forceful, clear, ringing oratory of Burton.

There is certainly a treat in store for this country. It is hinted at Washington, and certainly possible that Burton will be the vice-presidential nominee, securing that nomination by the sheer force of his oratory and the dynamic force of his personality.

Let it be said here that the country would be fortunate with such a man as Burton in the vice-president's office—not particularly because he could accomplish so much as vice-president, but because the vice-presidency might be a stepping stone to the presidency.

Since the forceful personality of Theodore Roosevelt dominated American politics, we can think of no man whose characteristics better fit him for the highest office this nation has to offer.

Burton is fifty years old. We venture the prediction that you will hear much from him, in the next couple of decades.

It was a happy thought that struck upon the idea of bestowing upon Burton the honor of making the Coolidge nomination address, this bringing him into the spotlight of our national life.

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


