# WHO'S WHO IN THE NEWS

GENERAL ISAAC R. SHERWOOD, the oldest member of Congress, plans to retire from public life at the close of his term, which ends March 5, 1925. He will be 89 years of age on August 13, having been born in 1835 at Stan-

ford, Dutchess county, New York. His public
GENERAL career probably has no parallel in American
ISAAC politics. Unlike most politicians, he has not
SHERWOOD been a one-party man in his campaigns for

office. Since the war between the North and the South he has been elected to office fourteen times, as the candidate of three different parties—the Republican, the Greenback, and the Democratic. At present he is a

His political career started when he was 25 years old. His political career started when he was 25 years old. He was then elected on the Republican ticket as a probate judge in Williams county, Ohio. The Civil war broke out soon afterward, and General Sherwood enlisted in the Fourteenth infantry of Ohio. He fought in forty battles, was under fire for 123 days, was complimented many times for conduct, and was made a brigadier general by President Lincoln for "gallant and maritorious services" at the battle Lincoln for "gallant and meritorious services" at the battle of Resaca, Franklin, Tenn. Four years after he was mustered out of the service

he was elected secretary of state in Ohio on the Republican ticket. In 1873 he was a candidate on the Republican ticket for representative from the Sixth Ohio district. Elected, he served until 1875, when the Republican party failed to renominate him. He then moved to Toledo, where he joined the Greenback party and was elected a propate judge. When the Greenbackers lost their power he went over to the Democrats and was re-elected to his judgeship on their ticket

Sherwood suffered his first political defeat when he ran on the Democratic ticket for Congress. His attack on McKinley's war record cost him the election. In 1906 he ran again for Congress on the Democratic ticket in a district that was strongly Republican, and he was elected by a small majority. Since then he has been a familiar figure in the House. Although opposed by the best men put up by the Republicans, Sherwood has usually come through with flying colors. Even after President Wilson had publicly rebuked him in 1916 Sherwood received a plurality of 13,000.

The general intends to go back to his newspaper work. He served in 1865 as the editor of the Toledo Commercial. He was on the Cleveland Leader in 1865-66, the Toledo Journal in 1874-83, the Canton News-Democrat in 1888-98, and represented a Toledo newspaper in the press gallery of the House in 1921.

"The pacifists are, let us say, 500 in number in the large American educational institutions. One group pledges itself to take human life under no conditions. The other group seemingly would take human life for a thrill.

the less are amazed at each, condemn each, point to each as unfortunate results of university training—which, of course, neither is. But they have news value, get the publicity, hold the public attention.

"The thoughtful observer of campus life all over the country will tell you that the group which should concern us is that vast army of men and women students who are satisfied with a 'gentleman's' grade, who are content to 'get by,' who master nothing. They cram, they crib, they dodge. Today they pass an exam as a result of high pressure study. A week from now an exam in the same subject sprung on them unexpectedly would bowl them over.
