UTILIZING CLOSET SPACE

If you are very limited as to closet space these suggestions may help you. Have two shelves above instead of the usual one, for hats and extra covers that may be needed at night. Place another shelf at height of baseboard, six to eight inches from the floor, for shoes and rubbers. Put a pole across the closet to receive hangers for clothes, and screw a 10-cent curtain rod inside the door, about five feet from the floor. This is very handy for kimonos, sweaters, hosiery and many articles which are light in weight, will not crush, and are often needed hurriedly. A man often appreciates this rod in his room for ties. Place pockets for slippers on lower half of door. Cover a wire clothes hanger with maulin or cretonne to take care of silk or wash dresses. By carefully pinning at shoulders or necks they will not slip off and will hang smoothly.

Meat Souffle.—Two tablespoons butter, three tablespoons flour, one-half cup milk, one-half cup chopped leftover meat, one-half teaspoon salt, few grains of cayenne, yolks three

eggs, whites two eggs. Melt butter, add flour, stir until well blended, then pour on gradually one-half cup milk, stirring constantly. Bring to boiling point, add meat and seasoning. Add yolks of eggs beaten until thick and lemon-colored; cut, and fold in whites of eggs beaten until thick and dry. Put on cover and cook until firm, or put into oven until firm.

Pineapple Jelly.—Two cups boiling water, one-half cup sugar, one cup pineapple juice, three tablespoons lemon juice, two tablespoons gelatine, two tablespoons cold water over sugar and when sugar has dissolved add gelatine, which has been soaked in cold water for five minutes. Then add pineapple and lemon juice and strain. When mixture begins to thicken add canned pineapple cut in one-half inch cubes. Turn into mould that has first been dipped in cold water and chill thoroughly. Serve with whipped cream.

Now that the heating plant is not in use, all pipes, doors and other portions which are liable to rust should be protected with a paint coating. Such work may forestall inconvenience and repair bills next fall. There

are special products made for such surfaces; be sure the proper materials are used.

When cleaning silver knives try using a cork dipped in silver polish. If you use a dry powder, moisten it so it will adhere to the cork.

Italian Spaghetti.—One-half package of broken cooked spaghetti, two small onions, one green pepper, one bunch celery, one cup tomatoes. Fry the onions, peppers and celery in butter until half done, add to tomatoes and spaghetti and bake slowly at least two hours.

Baked Noodles.—Cook noodles same as spaghetti. White Sauce: Three-quarters cup milk, one-fourth cup evaporated milk, one-fourth cup butter, two tablespoons flour, one-half package snappy cheese. Fry cubes of stale bread in butter until brown. Serve noodles on platter with cubes of bread on top.

Broiled Whitefish.—Clean and remove backbone, open on broiler, rub with lemon and piece of butter, and broil until brown and done. Serve with lemon and parsley.

Strawberry Shortcake.—Sift together one cup flour, two teaspoons baking powder, a little salt, one tablespoon shortening, milk to make batter like cake. Bake one minute, bake in pie tins in hot oven twelve minutes, butter, serve hot. This is not to be split and if made right will be very light. Have on ice your berries cut up and sugared, also deep dish for whipping cream and dozer egg beater. If all your utensils are ice cold it will only take a minute to whip the cream when wanted.

A little ammonia poured on a cloth and briskly applied cleans discolored coat collars about as effectively as anything.

Macaroni with Chipped Beef.—Break macaroni in one-inch pieces (three-quarters cup) and cook in boiling water. Remove skin from one-quarter pound thinly sliced smoked dried beef and separate in pieces. Cover with hot water, let stand ten minutes, and drain. Arrange in buttered baking dish alternate layers of macaroni and chipped beef, having two of each. Pour over two cups white sauce, cover with three-quarters cup buttered cracker crumbs, and bake in hot oven until crumbs are brown. For the white sauce melt four tablespoons butter, add three tablespoons flour, and stir until well blended, then pour on gradually two cups milk, stirring constantly. Bring to the boiling point and add one-half teaspoon salt and one-eighth teaspoon pepper.

VACATION DAYS
Just because school is out, do not let the children lead an utterly aimless, worthless existence. Have certain tasks for each one to do and see that they do them. I know this is going to be hard on Mother, but for her I am afraid there is no vacation unless she can get away from home without the family. Macaroni, Virginia Style.—One and one-half cups macaroni, two tablespoons butter, one teaspoon mustard, one and one-half cups grated cheese, one and one-quarter cups white sauce, three tablespoons dried bread crumbs. Break macaroni in one-half-inch pieces and cook in boiling salted water twenty minutes, or until soft; drain in colander and pour over one quart cold water. Put half in buttered baking dish, dot over with one-quarter the butter, and sprinkle with one-half the mustard and cheese; repeat, pour over white sauce, cover with dried bread crumbs mixed with remaining butter, and bake in a hot oven until crumbs are brown.

To obtain a good navy blue when dyeing cotton material, add from one-quarter to an entire package of black dye to the navy.

To clean frying pans, drain all the fat out you can, wipe the articles with newspapers, and half the work of cleaning is done.

Lettuce and Pimento Salad.—Remove leaves from one head lettuce, wash, drain and dry. Arrange in bowl as near the original shape as possible and sprinkle with one-half cup canned pimentos cut in strips. Just before serving, pour over French dressing.

Asparagus with Eggs.—Butter a baking dish. Pour in well seasoned white sauce about an inch deep. Lay as many cooked asparagus tips in this as you will need. Cover well with white sauce, and sprinkle with grated cheese. Onto this gently break six eggs. Bake about twenty minutes. Serve hot on toast.

Use a doubled crochet thread to sew on buttons. It takes only half the time of common thread, and the buttons are much firmer.
