Was Corporation Lawyer

FDGAR ADDISON BANCROFT, corporation lawyer of Chicago, has been chosen to succeed Cyrus E. Woods as ambassador to Japan. Bancroft, who is a brother of Frederic Bancroft, the historian, wil be 67 years old in November. He is a member of the law firm of Scott, Bancroft, Martin & McLeish. He is a native of Gales-burg, III., and a graduate of Knöx College and the Co-humbia Law School. He practiced law in Galesburg, later going to Chicago, where he became solicitor of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railway, and served in the same capacity with the Chicago & Western Indiana. From 1907 until 1920 he was general counsel of the International Harvester Company. Bancroft is the author of "The Chicago Strike of R594-95," "The Moral Sentiment of the People," "The Foundation of National Greatness," and "The Destruc-tion or Regulation of Trusts."
