After all possible evidence and testimony has been introduced, the grand jury will vote on the question of issuing indictments against each one of the possible defendants. In case indictments are issued, the defendants will appear before Superior Court for arraignment and the date of trial will be set.

It was stated yesterday afternoon that Deputy District Attorney Richardson who is conducting the investigation before the grand jury is not the brother of Attorney John L. Richardson, whom former Chief Anderson has retained as counsel. John L. Richardson has a brother on the district attorney's staff, but the investigator in the alleged extortion case is not he.
