Will Recement Jamieson Deep Test Hole Soon

Company Is Not Discouraged by Showings at Lora J. Bore

Not in the least discouraged by the fact that the Lora J. swabbed wet last week, the Jamieson Oil Company is planning to run a combination string into the hole, cement through the perforations, and proceed with the search for the much-debated second oil sand.

The running of this combination water and oil string will not be started for several days. Then the cement must be forced out through the perforations and "allowed to harden. Then if a shut-off is secured the hole will be drilled ahead. It may be a matter of several weeks before the bit will again be rotating in the interesting probe for the deep productive formation.

While drilling at the Lora J. is held up, the Shell Oil Company is pioneering ahead at Kottler No. 2. The bottom of the hole is now well below 4900 feet. A core taken out of this hole yesterday revealed a hard shale formation and five inches of sandstone.

The Shell test has never been altogether discouraging, there having been at all levels sufficient encouraging signs to warrant deeper drilling. The crew is still coring every foot of the way down.

Two other deep wells, one in edge territory and one way off the top structure, are being drilled. Standard's Ellinwood in the southwestern extension is down 4700 feet, having encountered no appreciable showings of oil. The Chanstor-Canfield Midway Oil Company's Francis No. 1 on Western avenue north of Torrance is now the deepest hole ever drilled in the field. It is 5700 feet deep and the bit is still "doing its stuff."

The one illustrated (center) is developed in navy chinchilla cloth. It is double-breasted and depends for its trimmings on beautiful tailoring.
