Art Exhibition Of Club Women Promises Treat

Display of Fine Paintings Will Be Held Next Thursday

The people of Torrance will be afforded a rare treat next Thursday, Jan. 22, when many pictures and other valuable pieces of art will be exhibited at the Central church guild hall under the auspices of the Women's Club of Torrance.

Probably the most interesting exhibit will be the \$1000 prize picture, "Witchery Winter," which was painted in the spring of 1924 the art chairman of the Los Angeles district of Women's Clubs, in order to introduce and promote California rather than foreign art, offered \$1000 for the best California picture.

Over 400 artists of the Golden State displayed their pictures at the exhibit in Exposition Park, Los Angeles, in April of last year. A winter scene in Yosemite valley, "Witchery Winter," the work of Benjamin Brown, was awarded the honors.

The art chairman of the Los Angeles district wished the clubs to solicit an interest in the picture and solicited \$10 from each club. At that time the executive board of the local club considered such a step, and for financial reasons did not deem it best to contribute the \$10.

Mrs. Willis M. Brooks, an artist herself and having many artist friends in Los Angeles, arranged to conduct members of the Torrance club who cared to go on a tour through Los Angeles studios. Twenty club members took the trip, and those not having cars each paid 50 cents, and in that way the \$10 was raised. The last studio visited was that of Mrs. Leighton, the federation art chairman, and the \$10 was left there, and in this way the Torrance club became part owner of the wonderful picture.

Torrance Pictures Mrs. J. S. Torrance, who will be the guest of Mrs. Brooks during the day, will exhibit four pictures from the Jared S. Torrance collection, gathered by Mr. Torrance while abroad.

Another wonderful picture will be a surprise exhibit. It is by a local artist, has been exhibited in many galleries both in Long Beach and Los Angeles, and the model is the daughter of one of the Torrance club members. It will be of special interest to local people. This picture is being brought here from a Los Angeles gallery for the occasion.

From the museum in Los Angeles will be brought several Japanese pictures, paintings of Mrs. Chase, art teacher at the local high school.

Mrs. Nettie Steinhilber will exhibit a famous scene embroidered in silk. This is a wonder, the planning of which represents the life work of a sister in a convent which was attended by Mrs. Steinhilber when a girl.

Beautiful Shade A beautiful parchment lamp shade, painted by an artist who served in the World War and now lies in the Valley of the Shadow of Death in the hospital at Sawtelle, a victim of German gas, will be shown. This shade sold for \$85. Mr. Catton, the etcher, will exhibit many of his etchings, and his wife will be present and talk to the club members and friends on the making of pictures.

A bedspread over 200 years old, together with many other exhibits, will show the art of our great-grandmothers' day, and there will also be modern homespun and many articles to show modern applied art as well.

This wonderful exhibit will be in charge of Mrs. Willis M. Brooks, art chairman of the Torrance Women's Club, who, supported by a well chosen committee, will make this a day long to be remembered in Torrance.

There will be an added session from 5 to 7 o'clock in the afternoon for the men of Torrance who cannot attend the exhibit earlier in the afternoon.

Over 3000 square feet of floor space are comprised in—the new location of this store, in which handsome fixtures of the most modern type have been installed. The old store at 1650 Cabrillo avenue will close its doors tomorrow evening and the stock will be moved across the street to the new store, 1639 Cabrillo, in time for business as usual on Monday.

Charles M. Inman, who has been connected with the Daley chain for more than eight years and whose efficient supervision has contributed much to the prosperity of the Torrance store, will continue as manager of the new store. He announces that there will be no change in the personnel of the staff.

L. Ott's meat market is already located in the new quarters and has been in operation there since last Monday. Mr. Ott has spared no expense in fittings and fixtures with which to make his place of business conform to the highest modern standards. Included in his equipment is a refrigerating plant which maintains a steady, uniform temperature throughout the storage rooms and insures a strictly fresh and sanitary supply of meat at all times.

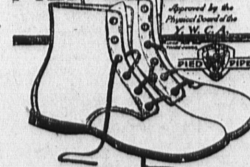
