Miss Lucy Morford of Carson street, accompanied by her cousin, was a Catalina visitor Sunday.

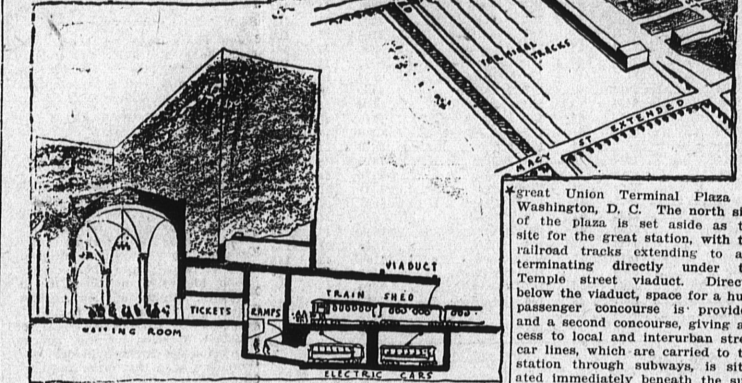
Rev. and Mrs. J. H. Mallovs of Claremont will be weekend guests of Dr. and Mrs. N. A. Leake of Marcellina avenue.

L. A. Union Terminal Plan Majestic

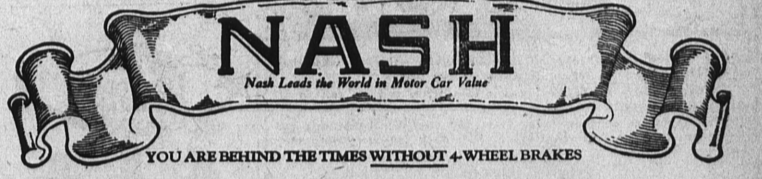
