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U. S. Foreign Service Leads Woods Sees It as One Hope

"THE foreign service of the United States is the equal if not the superior of any in the world," said Cyrus E. Woods, former United States ambassador to Japan, in a recent address. "It has always stood for fairness and frankness and honesty in its dealings with other nations. Its methods have been open and direct. It has demanded and secured equality of opportunity for its nationals throughout the world. Its sincerity has never been questioned. It stands today as the exemplar and the originator of the new diplomacy.

and the originator of the new diplomacy. "I do not believe that the diplomatic service of any country can furnish a list of men of such great distinction as can the United States. It would not be possible for any country to keep permanently in its diplomatic employ so large a number of its distinguished leaders. Their training was so broad and of such a character as to make them more capable of meeting an emergency than any mere training in diplomacy alone could possible convey to them. "I do not wish to be understood as opposing a trained

could possible convey to them. "I do not wish to be understood as opposing a trained diplomatic service, because I am very much in favor of it. It has been my pleasure to have associated with me some men in the regular service who were of marked ability and who were rendering distinguished service to their country. My point is that knowledge of diplo-matic forms and precedents is not alone sufficient. The American diplomat today is dealing with questions of world politics and with questions of world trade, and he must be able to solve the problems arising from them with vision and with understanding. Public Should Take Interest "It is to be regretted that the American people do

"It is to be regretted that the American people do not take more interest in their foreign service. No department of the government is so little appreciated or so little understood.

or so little understood. "The problems of the world today are more complex than they have ever been before. By virtue of our economic and financial position, we are associated with these problems, and we are destined to play an im-portant part in their solution. In finding this solution the foreign service of the United States will be destined to lead the way. We believe that our diplomatic future will be a repetition of our diplomatic past, and that suc-cess will be ours, and that our foreign service will keep our flag ever in the front rank of all the nations as an emblem of liberty and peace and good-will."



RENE DESCARTES preached that good sense is, of all things among men, the most equally distributed "for every one thinks himself so abundantly provided with it, that those even who are the most difficult to satisfy in everything else, do not usually desire a larger measure of this quality than they already posses." And in this it is not likely that all are mistaken, he argues.

"The conviction is rather to be held as testifying that the power of judging aright and distinguishing Truth from Error, which is properly what is called Good Sense or Reason, is. by nature equal in all men; and that the diversity of our opinions, consequently, does not arise from some being endowed with a larger share of Reason than others, but solely from this, that we conduct our thoughts along different ways, and do not affix our attention on the same objects."

It is easier to prove that the diversity of our opinions is due to the circumstance that some men are en-dowed with a larger share of reason than others, than to support Descartes' argument. But the greatest minds, as they are capable of the highest excellencies, are open likewise to the greatest berrations' and it is usually true that those who travel very slowly make for greater progress, provided they keep always to the straight road, than those who, while they run, forsake it-

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
