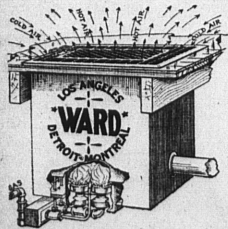

The police sent a messenger to San Pedro for tear-gas bombs.

And then one of the officers spoke to Way, asking him quietly to come out and give himself up. Dejected, with a woebegone expression on his face, like a guilty child, the demented man obeyed the call and walked slowly from the door of the house. The rifle which he had carried was seized. It was unloaded.

Police slipped handcuffs on his hands, led him to an automobile, and drove him to Los Angeles.

The crowd dispersed, laughing.

In the company of officers, safely handcuffed, the poor, demented man went dazedly and without full comprehension to the psychopathic ward of the county jail.
