Plan Financing
On Feb. 14 definite plans for the financing of the clubhouse and its construction had been perfected and a questionnaire setting forth the details of two plans was explained to members. The questionnaire was mailed to members. They elected that a home be constructed according to a plan of financing made possible by the generosity of Brian K. Welch and his family. The plan stipulated that a corporation be formed and Mrs. Henderson was authorized to take steps toward incorporation.

on Feb. 26 a motion was unanimously carried that Lot 18, Block 26, be purchased from the Dominguez Land Corporation. On Feb. 28 Mrs. Gilbert reported the sum of \$421.02 in the building fund and Mrs. Henderson reported that pledges for stock in the proposed corporation totaled \$1891.

Incorporation papers were approved by the state on May 1, 1924.

On June 12 the club held its annual meeting. The following officers were elected: President, Mrs. J. M. Fitzhugh; vice-president, Mrs. F. L. Parks; second vice-president, Mrs. Florence Peckham; third vice-president, Mrs. Florence Peckham; third vice-president, Mrs. Edna Stone; recording secretary, Mrs. M. J. Neelands; corresponding secretary, Mrs. Phoebe Milburn; federation secretary, Mrs. John Young; treasurer, Mrs. W. H. Gilbert. The following directors were elected: Mrs. Isabel Henderson, Mrs. A. P. Stevenson, and Mrs. P. G. Briney.

The first meeting of the Women's Club of Torrance, Incorporated, was held on July 3, 1924. The following directors were elected: Mrs. Isabel Henderson, Mrs. Hurum E. Reeve, J. W. Post, George W. Neill, and W. Harold Kingsley. Constitution and by-laws were adopted.

The directors met on the same day and elected the following officers: President, J. W. Post; vice-president, George W. Neill; secretary-treasurer, W. Harold Kingsley.

On Oct. 9, 1924, the corporation was granted a permit for the sale of stock. Mrs. Hurum Reeve, acting as chairman of the building committee, to which she was appointed when Mrs. Henderson resigned, worked diligently for several months. It was her devotion to the cause of the club and her effort that contributed most to the financing of the clubhouse. With this amount of stock sold, Brian K. Welch offered to purchase enough more stock for himself and his family to make construction of the building possible.

The building was erected by the Industrial Housing Corporation on a basis of cost plus 10 percent. Subcontractors in many cases took part payment for their work in stock in the club.

The corporation then authorized a mortgage on the building and entered into a lease with the Women's Club.

the building and entered into a lease with the Women's Club.

To carry this lease, maintain the clubhouse, retire the mortgage and retire stock so that the club will eventually own the building and lot, it is necessary for the women's organization to raise between \$200 and \$250 a month. This they are setting out to do.

The value of the clubhouse to the community cannot be overestimated. Its benefits will be more fully realized in months and years to come. It is noteworthy that the building has effected a great increase in the membership of the Women's Club. At the time the questionnaire on the building proposals were sent out the membership in the club was 78.

Today it is 218.
