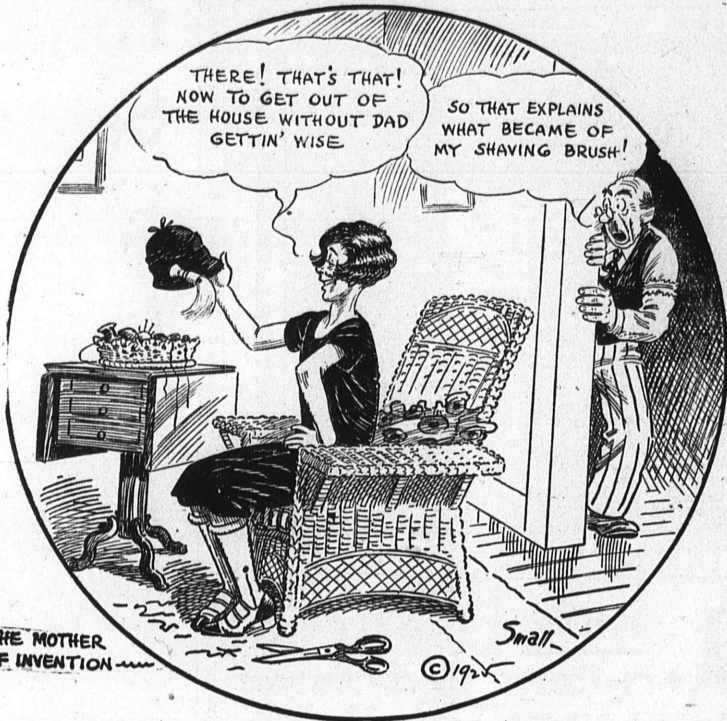

RESOLUTION OF INTENTION No. 260

MARTINA AVENUE A Resolution of the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance, De- claring Its Intention to Order the Improvement of Martina Avenue, Within Said City.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance, California, pur- suant to the "Improvement Act of 1915" and the "Improvement Bond Act of 1915," do resolve as follows:

SECTION 1. That the public in- terest and convenience require and that it is the intention of the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance to order the following work to be done and improvement to be made in said City, to-wit:

That MARTINA AVENUE, from the southerly line of 220th Street to the northeasterly line of Plaza del Amo, be graded and that the roadway space thereof be paved with six (6) inch Cement Concrete pavement, and that Cement Con- crete curbs and walks be con- structed thereon.

That all of the above described work or improvements be done at

the places, to the extent and in the manner shown on the plans and detailed drawings thereon on file in the Office of the City Engineer and in accordance with specifica- tions No. 24 for the construction of Cement Concrete Pavement and Ordinance No. 19 of the said City for the construction of Cement Concrete Curbs and walks on file in the Office of the City Clerk of said City.

All of which plans, detailed drawings and specifications are hereby referred to for a more par- ticular description of said work or improvement, and by reference thereto are hereby made a part hereof.

SECTION 2. That the said pro- posed work or improvement in the opinion of the Board of Trustees, is of more than local or ordinary public benefit, and the costs and expenses of said proposed work or improvement are hereby made chargeable upon a district which said district the said Board of Trustees hereby declares to be the district benefited by the said pro- posed work or improvement, and to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof, which said dis- trict is bounded and described as follows, to-wit:

Beginning at a point on the southerly line of 220th Street in said City, a point thereon (135) one hundred thirty-five feet east- erty of the easterly line of Mar- tina Avenue, and running thence southerly parallel with the said easterly line of said Martina Ave- nue to the northeasterly line of Plaza del Amo, Thence north- westerly along the said northeasterly line of said Plaza del Amo to a point thereon distant one hundred thirty-five (135) feet at right angles westerly from the westerly line of said Martina Avenue, Thence northerly parallel with the said westerly line of the Martina Avenue to the point of intersection with the westerly prolongation of the southerly line of 220th Street, Thence easterly in a direct line to the point of beginning, excepting from the above all public streets, avenues, places or alleys included therein.

SECTION 3. Notice is hereby given that serial bonds to repre- sent unpaid assessments and bear interest at the rate of seven (7) per cent per annum, will be issued hereunder in the manner pro- vided by the "Improvement Bond Act of 1915," the last installment of which bonds shall mature nine (9) years from the second day of July next succeeding ten (10) months from their date.

SECTION 4. Notice is hereby given that on Monday, the 16th day of November, 1925, at Seven o'Clock P. M., in the Council Cham- ber of the City Hall of said City of Torrance, California, any and all persons having any objections to the proposed work or improve- ment may appear before the said Board of Trustees and show cause why said proposed improvement should not be carried out in ac- cordance with this resolution.

SECTION 5. The City Clerk shall cause this Resolution of In- tention to be published twice in the Torrance Herald, a weekly newspaper published and circulated in said City and hereby designated for that purpose by the Board of Trustees of said City.

The Board of Trustees do not deem it advisable that the Clerk mail copies to the owners or re- puted owners, and the City Clerk need not mail copies of said notice.

SECTION 6. The Street Super- intendent of said City is hereby directed to post Notices of Im-

provement as required by statute. Adopted and approved October 26th, 1925.

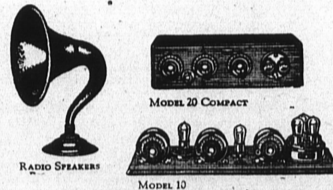
