### JUSTICE COURT

Pleading guilty to violations of the Wright act, the following men paid fines in the justice court recently: J. M. Owens, Wardlaw boulevard, Long Beach, \$20; Joe Pronzo, Ocean avenue near Hynes, \$150; Frank Grama, Manhattan Beach, \$100; Lester Gerwig, Huntington Park, \$100; Joe Galbavy, \$100 on two counts, possession of liquor and possession of apparatus designed for manufacture.

Joe Galbavy, charged with manufacturing liquor, a high grade misdemeanor, will have a preliminary hearing Dec. 29, and is at liberty under \$3000 property bond.

Valentino Moro and Arcadio Lorrarrago pleaded not guilty to violations of the Wright act, and will have a jury trial Jan. 5. They are in jail in lieu of \$1000 bail each.

Commitments were issued in the cases of Jesse Hernandez, 748 Maple avenue, and John Murlolo, Manhattan Beach, charged with violations of the Wright act and fined, respectively, \$250 and \$150.

C. H. McCormack, a sailor, was arrested at the football game Sunday, charged with violation of the Wright act. The defendant and evidence were released Monday to Lieut. W. J. Russell of the shore patrol of the U. S. S. Nevada.

The urgency of the situation in the prevention of tuberculosis was stressed today by Rev. Francis A. Zeller, who said: "I am informed by the county health officer that the need of helping the anti-tuberculosis cause by the purchase of Christmas seals is very urgent. Owing to the rapid growth in population here hundreds of cases cannot be sent to hospitals and must be cared for in their homes. This means many contacts or exposures of children and renewed efforts to prevent the spread of the disease.

"The Christmas seal provides a fund to help build up resistance and is an absolute necessity under present conditions. The County Tuberculosis Association is doing a wonderful work and deserves your financial assistance. "The seals have been mailed to you in order to save time and expense of solicitation. Return your contribution promptly.
