But if one of these reformers tried to broadcast the idea that Democracy is the underlying cause of this prevailing lack of home-interest and therefore the root of all our social problems, he would be clubbed from the country.

DEMOCRACY is predicated on the proposition that all men are created equal. This is not so. Men are created unequal. To assume that each has equal mental endowments at birth is as absurd as to believe that each is physically strong.

Yet our public school system, which can teach no faster than the ability of the dullest pupil to absorb, is based on this equality fallacy.

It is interesting to note in this connection that the latest move in educational circles is toward dividing each class into three sections—one for the dull, one for the average, and one for the unusually intelligent. Such a system will be better for the dull, better for the average, better for the bright pupils, and infinitely better for society.

Which proves, by the way, that in questioning some of the accepted truths about the wonders of Democracy I have many leading educators on my side.
