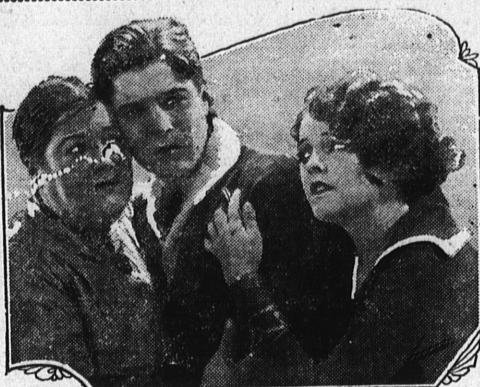

California Fruit Exposition At Alhambra January 21 to 31

ALHAMBRA.—Commensurate in its scope and beauty with the enormous crop of fruit of all kinds produced during the past year in California, which has returned to the growers between \$180,000,000 and \$190,000,000, the opening of the California Fruit Exposition at Alhambra Jan. 21 marks one of the most important events of this character ever inaugurated in the southwest. The exposition will continue until Jan. 31. Big Avocado Show The exhibits entered in the fruit department include practically every variety of citrus, deciduous and subtropical fruits grown in California, and come from all parts of the state. Besides the immense displays of oranges, lemons and grapefruit of the finest quality, and the varied classes of apples, pears, peaches, apricots and other deciduous fruits, an interesting feature of the exposition will be the largest exhibit of avocados ever shown in America, including more than 70 varieties. The setting provided for the fruit and flower exhibits is novel and beautiful. The displays are seen through Moorish arches, the decorative detail having been faithfully reproduced from that of the world-famed old Palace of the Alhambra at Granada, Spain, and as a background for the fruit there has been completed a panoramic oil painting of California landscape, including a wide range of California scenic attractions. Beginning in the northern portion of the state, Glacier Lake, Lake Tahoe, Mount Shasta and the Sacramento River are shown. These are followed by Tioga Pass, the Yosemite, the Santa Clara Valley, Monterey Bay, the San Luis Obispo district, the Santa Barbara Mountains, and Catalina. Continuing southward, the landscape features include Laguna Bay, Mount St. Antonio, Mount San Jacinto, the Yucaipa Valley, and various fruit sections and points of interest in Southern California. The painting is 700 feet long by seven and one-half feet in width.
