To add injury to insult, the edition was mailed liberally, with the result that considerable dust was raised where a perfect calm existed.

This sad state of affairs has not only occurred at Southern California, but a like case has come up at the University of California, Southern Branch. John Cohee, editor of the Daily Grizzler, was unceremoniously ousted from the editorship of the publication following the issue of "Hell's Bell," a razz-berry edition. It was the writer's privilege to meet Mr. Cohee at the recent Pacific Intercollegiate Press Association meeting held at Eugene, Oregon, and he impressed as being a thorough gentleman.

His paper has been one in which his character was reflected, a real clean, honest collegiate journal, yet the razz-berry edition, which is primarily a humorous edition and one in which the editors should have the privilege to revert to a more undignified and informal policy, was misconstrued by many, with the result that Cohee has been firmly ousted from office.

This all brings us to the question of college humor, and as we said before we refuse to discuss it or to ever take an active part in it, for the writer holds high hopes of some day receiving a degree and would like to remain until that time a member of this or any other university.

## Education Road Show To Come Here Feb. 13th

Exhibit Put On by Big Group Booked for Torrance

Preparations are under way to greet the educational road show, which will visit Torrance on Friday, Feb. 13, according to an announcement by Schultz, Peckham and Schultz, local Ford dealers.

Declared to be the greatest exhibition of automobiles, trucks, tractors, farm, industrial and commercial equipment ever organized as a traveling unit, the road show will visit nearly every city and town in Southern California, covering an itinerary which will require fifteen weeks to complete and will traverse approximately 6000 miles.

The show is unique in that a large number of the motorized units in the caravan operate under their own power. The average traveling speed is eight miles an hour, and when under way the show will form a parade nearly a half mile in length.
