Forbearance, of course, is a praiseworthy national characteristic. We Americans have it in large measure. A little more of it might do much to tighten the grip of the hands across the sea sort of thing that London is always talking about.

THE Railroad Commission will conduct a hearing next Tuesday on the much mooted Plaza union station question. It is to be hoped that the commission will consider the requirements of the public as more important than the desire of property owners who are seeking through the Plaza station plan, to bring the center of Los Angeles back where it used to be and thus appreciate the value of their own holdings at the expense of public convenience.

In all their dealings with the public, railroad companies are not right, but they most certainly are right on this station matter. The plan of the railroads has been endorsed by most of the interested authorities in Los Angeles County. It is agreed upon by all transcontinental lines entering Los Angeles. It is to be hoped that the railroad commission will decide for the people and against the Plaza property owners.

Must Elect Successor
The trustees have 30 days in which to appoint a successor to Mr. Torrance. If a successor is appointed, his term will expire when the new board of trustees takes office, so that a successor must be elected by the people at the April election. Two of the three trustees to be named in April will be elected for terms of four years each. Mr. Torrance's successor will be elected to serve two years.
