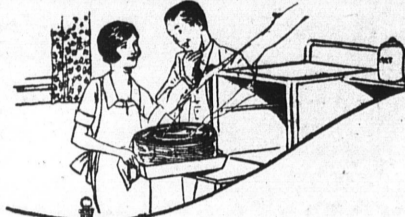

Bishop for Judge

Superior Court Judge Edward T. Bishop, the youngest Judge ever to sit as presiding Judge, has announced his candidacy to succeed himself for the unexpired term of L. H. Valentine. This announcement, made in Los Angeles this week, has brought a widespread response, both from the bar and from the lay public, and an organization has already been formed by influential lawyers to push his campaign.

Judge Bishop has had an interesting legal career, and members of his volunteer campaign committee will point to it to emphasize their claims that he is a "superior" candidate as well as a "superior" Judge. He was appointed to the superior bench by Governor Richardson, and, although he is the youngest Judge ever to hold such an honor, Presiding Judge Albert Lee Stephens invited him to act as Presiding Judge Pro Tem, while Judge Stephens is in Visalia hearing a case.



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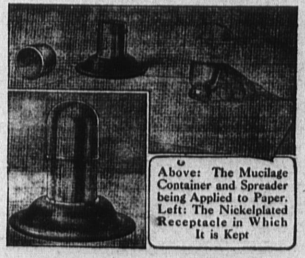
