City of Torrance do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Ordinances No. 40. 1
44. and 125, are hereby repealed.
SECTION 2. It shall be unlaw-trained to conduct or keep open for business any pool, billiard or business in the City of Torrance between the hours of 12 o'clock midnight and 5 o'clock A.M. on any day in the week except Sunday; and on Sunday it shall be unlawful to so conduct or keep open any such business between the hours of 1 o'clock A.M. and 5 o'clock A.M. and 5 o'clock A.M. SECTION 3. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, to allow any minor to play pool, billiards of bowling, or any game in au place of business in the City of Torrance.
