APRESSING demand for modern five-room houses on adequate lots and within the buying power of workingmen bids fair to be answered in Torrance by the organization of the Torrance Home Builders, Incorporated.

The Herald, along with all individuals and organizations interested in the future of this city, welcomes the promised activity of this new group into the life of Torrance.

When Jared Sidney Torrance formulated his plans for "The Modern Industrial City" he realized that moderately priced homes, well built and capable of being sold on small down payments, were essential to the progress of Torrance. So he built houses to suit the certain need.

The war intervened to hold Torrance back and delay the continued execution of the Torrance plan.

Then followed the oil boom. Land prices soared. Owners of property could not build residences on such high-priced land and receive any kind of an adequate return on their money by renting them for prices within the reach of families of fixed income.

Prices of land have now settled down to normal. Lots can be acquired and are being acquired in Torrance at prices that are not only reasonable, but cheap, when one considers what a buyer acquires in the way of public improvements when he purchases a lot in Torrance.

Realizing the demand for dwellings within reach of families with moderate incomes, a group of Torrance men, actuated by a desire to build up this city, conceived the idea of a building corporation, financed by Torrance men, all going into the proposition on an equal basis.

How well their idea was received is indicated by the fact that in two weeks 68 stockholders have entered the company, which is capitalized at \$50,000.

company, which is capitalized at \$50,000.

The subscription books are still open and it is expected that the number of stockholders wil reach the 100 mark. A number of lots have been purchased and building operations will start as soon as details can be perfected. Five-room houses, properly and soundly built, will be constructed on the lots and sold at reasonable prices. The price is designed more to build up Torrance than to realize a profit on an investment.

Properly administered the Torrance Home Builders, Incorporated, easily can develop into a great force for the progress of this city.

THE HOLLYWOOD-PALOS VERDES PARKWAY

W RUFUS PAGE of Torrance, director of the Southwest W. Parks and Parkways Improvement Association, has prepared an article on the proposed Hollywood-Palos Verdes Parkway, stressing particularly the significance of this highway to Torrance. Mr. Page's article follows:

This thoroughfare will not be a boulevard but a real

parkway—just the same as if you were driving between two beautiful parks all the way from Hollywood to the Pacific ocean and to the entrance to the Palos Verdes Pacific ocean and to the entrance to the Palos Verdes Estates. This parkway will be 25 miles long and 225 feet wide, and it will actually occupy approximately 640 acres of land. There will be a drive or speedway in the center of the parkway about 80 feet wide. On each side of this drive or speedway there will be a parkway or strip of land planted in trees, shrubbery and flowers. Next there will be a bridle trail for those who enjoy horseback riding. Then there will be another strip of land or parkway on each side, properly landscaped and beautified. Next on each side there will be a paved roadway to serve the on each side there will be a paved roadway to serve the magnificent homes along this parkway, and there will be plenty of these homes.

plenty of these homes.

There is nothing in California at this time to compare with this projected parkway in magnificence, beauty and usefulness; and there are few parkways in the United States that will equal and none that will surpass it.

The work will be done under the acquisition and improvement act sponsored by Mr. Mattoon. The legality of this act has been established by the Supreme Court of the State of California, and there is now no question as to its validity.

This parkway is being sponsored by the Community Development Association, with Mr. Henry O'Melveney in charge. This association is composed of five leading newspapers of Los Angeles and some of the most progressive and influențial citizens of Los Angeles. The plans for the parkway are now being prepared by Olmstead Brothers, who are nationally known city planning experts and land-scape gardeners.

About four and one-half miles of this parkway will be in Torrance and many of us are interested in the cost of it. Estimates of the cost are now being prepared and everyone interested will be advised before the actual construction begins. It may be said now that the cost to the property owners in our district will be much lower than in the district to the north of us. It is also proper to say now that this assessment will be spread over a period of 30 years at a low rate of interest and will not be burdensome. The proposed assessment district begins at 114th street and extends through Torrance to the Pacific ocean between Redondo Beach and the Palos Verdes Estates and contains approximately 28,000 acres of land. Most of the territory in the district through which the parkway will pass is sparsely settled and a great deal of the right of way will be donated, thus reducing the expenses a great deal.

Now what does all this mean to the people of Torrance? It means that hundreds of thousands of people will drive through the heart of Torrance who never saw or heard of the place before. It means that the best class of residences in Southern California will be located along or near this parkway, and as one-fifth of the entire parkway will be in Torrance, the benefits for Torrance will be proposed.

This magnificent parkway, coming out of the heart of the richest district in the city of Los Angeles, through Torrance, into the Palos Verdes Estates, will be the talk the nation.

This parkway absolutely assures a high class residential section in all of the territory through which it passes—no undesirables will inhabit this territory close to the parkway, and living conditions wil be almost ideal and very desirable.

There will not be an hour in the entire day that you cannot see large and luxurious sight-seeing busses on this parkway in the city of Torrance. Does this mean anything to Torrance? Well, I'll say it does, and "a-plenty."
