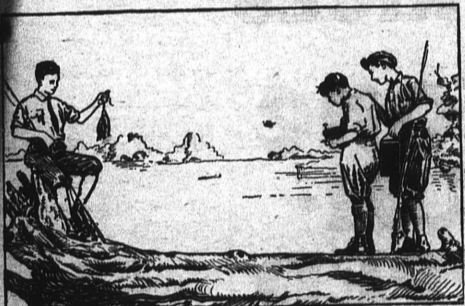

Rex Beach Film Will Open Week At the Torrance

"The Barrier" on Tonight: Tom Mix as Mounted Policeman Saturday

Many a motion picture actress who had bobbed in haste repented at leisure when Director George Hill cast about for a leading woman in "The Barrier," the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer screen version of Rex Beach's famous novel.

Even though Tom Mix has deserted his ranch to become a mounted policeman in Fox Film's "My Own Pal," his latest starring vehicle, coming to the Torrance Theatre Saturday, it does not mean that he has left his riding and roping and thrilling adventures at his ranch.

Quite the opposite! "My Own Pal" is one of the most thrilling of the Mix pictures ever screened—more than that, it represents one of the best pieces of work the genial western star has ever done.

Georgia Hale, whose portrayal of a dance hall girl in Charles Chaplin's "The Gold Rush" made her famous overnight, plays a similar role in "The Rainmaker," the new Paramount love drama which comes to the Torrance Theatre Sunday and Monday.

In this picturization of Gerald Beaumont's famous racing story, "Havenbent," which Clarence Badger transferred to the screen, she is first a cabaret entertainer, then a novice nurse, but eventually returns to the dance hall life.
