THE remarks of E. O. Faulkner of the Chanslor-Canfield Midway Oil Company, Santa Fe subsidiary, at the Rotary Club luncheon last Thursday, were preg-nant with significance to Torrance.

 The progress and prosperity of Torrance is dependent in every analysis on the progress and prosperity of the institutions which constitute the economic foundation of Torrance.
 And added to the institutions which have been this city's foundation we now have the Santa Fe Railroad Company, owning 800 acres of land inside the city limits and proposing with all speed possible to develop this acreage industrially.
 Every person in Torrance who has the interests of his city at heart and every person who takes his own economic position seriously—and who does not?—should congratulate his city and himself for the possession of this company as an ally in every Torrance forward movement. forward movement.

By assisting the Santa Fe in its development the citizens of Torrance speed the proposed Santa Fe development and in so doing hurry the growth of Torrance and the betterment of the economic con-dition of every person here resident. It seems almost unnecessary to stress this fact, its truth is so evident.

It was thrown in our laps because after careful study the Santa Fe concluded that Torrance is the logical industrial center in the harbor district and the harbor district is the logical industrial center of Southern California. That the Chamber of Commerce industrial survey did much to convince the Santa Fe of the industrial advantages of Torrance is the statement by Santa Fe officials, but the decision of the company to buy 300 acres here and concentrate the activities of its industrial department on this tract's development. Now comes Mr. Faulkner, a man whose conserv-ation of statement is the result of half a century of railroad experience, and tells Torrance or lightings for the Santa Fe ead big things for Torrance. 
