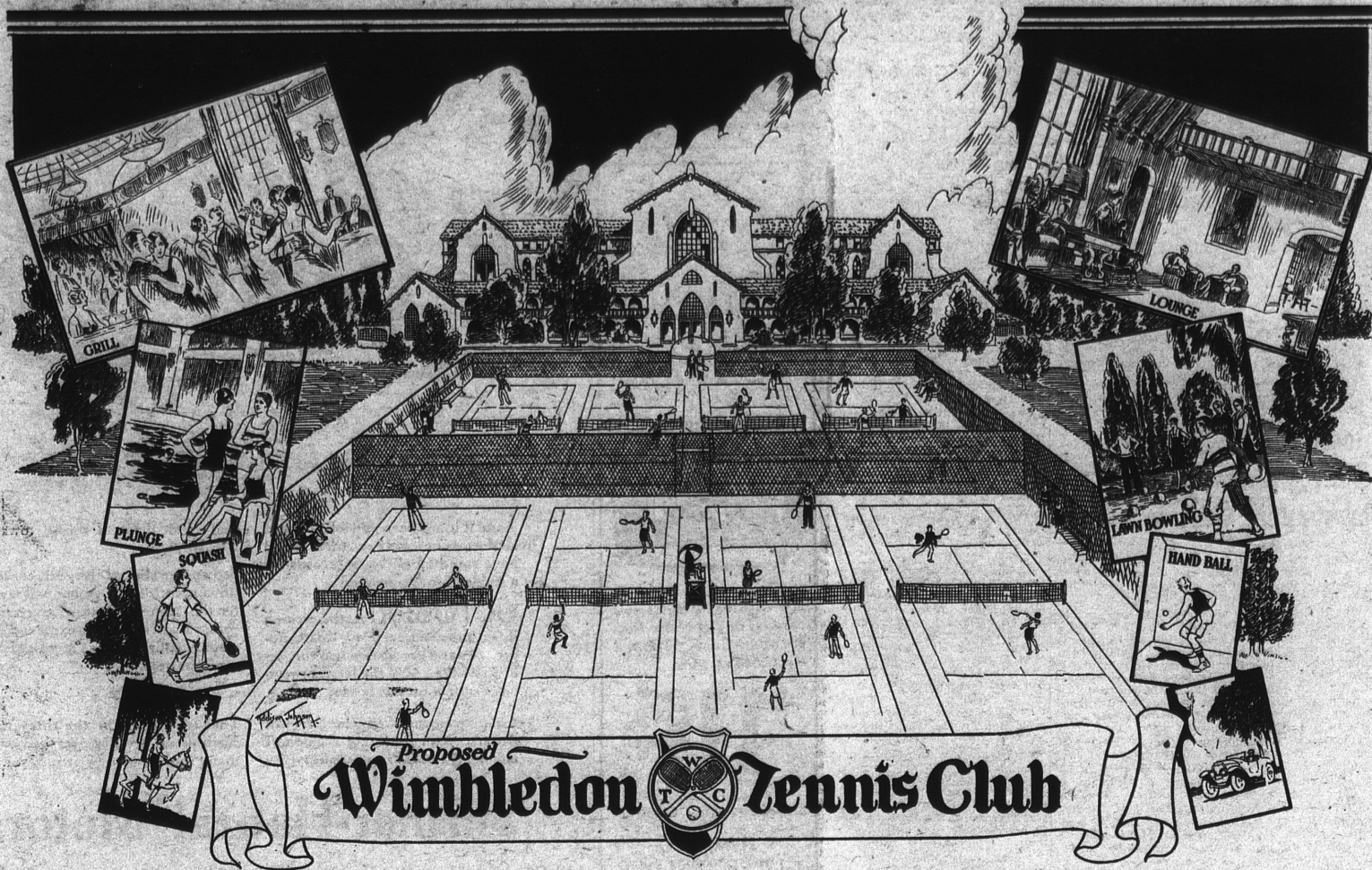


FINE NEW WIMBLEDON TENNIS CLUB WILL BE CONSTRUCTED SHORTLY IN THIS DISTRICT

Of unusual interest to residents, and especially players and athletic followers, of the Torrance-Compton district are the announced plans of the Wimbledon Tennis Club, calling for the early development of 16 acres of club property located on Artesia boulevard, or 1324 street, near Vermont avenue. In addition to eight or nine acres of permanently surfaced courts for general play, and lawn and clay courts for championship play, elaborate plans reveal an imposing clubhouse of fine appointments and class A construction that will house spacious lounge and whist rooms and a fine grill-dance room on the upper floor. On the first floor an indoor plunge and locker rooms will occupy one end of the clubhouse, and a gymnasium, a nursery, basketball and handball courts the other end. The latest in exercise apparatus will be provided in the gymnasium.

Next to Parkway The club property is surrounded by many present and proposed boulevards, and is generally high level and slightly. On the four acres of low ground, adjoining the proposed Los Angeles park or parkway, a large outdoor plunge will be located. Greens for bowling and probably for golf, putting and squash courts will also be provided.

As is typical of the tennis-playing fraternity, the board of governors of the Wimbledon Tennis Club are prominent men well qualified by their occupation and experience to guide the club to a position of high standing among the tennis clubs of the country. It is not the world," stated Wm. J. B. Stewart, who is handling the club's southwest district office, yesterday. "Ivan Kelso, general counsel of the Automobile Club of Southern California, heads the board of governors, with Dr. Homer A. Dahlman, director of the Los Angeles Tennis Club; Lester A. Hicks, president and general manager of the Pacific Brass and Hardware Manufacturing Company; W. E. Goodman, Goddard O'Rourke Motor Company; J. D. Cunningham, attorney; Dr. H. J. Ingersoll, manager Victor X-Ray Corporation; Marion Kyle, publisher California Sports Magazine; Eugene Ticho, importer; and Meredith R. Pratt, Los Angeles Evening Herald, promotion manager.

The Wimbledon Tennis Club, so named from the famous club at Wimbledon, England, that cradled tennis generations ago as the St. Andrews Club of Scotland cradled golf, was organized in Los Angeles several weeks ago to secure property and develop tennis facilities for the legion of tennis lovers who have had to forego their game there because of the notoriously inadequate facilities in or around that city. The announcement of the club plans met an instantaneous response, and the membership list is reported to be growing rapidly. While tennis players in every walk of life are enlisting under the club's banner, numerous teams are being organized in many of the industrial concerns there, such as the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company, the Union Oil Company, the General Petroleum Company, and the offices of the Automobile Club of Southern California.

The club will be corporation-owned and operated, relieving club members of any liability or the possibility of assessments, at the same time assuring the most of the best of equipment and service," stated Mr. Stewart. "Construction work will be started on the first

block of tennis courts next week. To assure a proper foundation the watered, settled, and rolled again, so that the permanent surfacing when laid will be permanently smooth and free from the permanent wave that may be popular in other courtings, but not in tennis courtings.

Courts will be available for play very early in the spring, if not shortly after the first of the year.
