Federation Council of Presidents Meet Nov. 10 at Pomona

Blaisdell, Pomona College president, having recently returned from a tour abroad, will bring his own personal observations and conclusions to the club women in an address on "International Relations"; Arthur S. Dent, president of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce, will discuss "Trade Relations in Connection With World Peace."

Three other interesting features of the day will be "Ideals of the National Education Association," by Miss Gladys Moorhead, president of the City Teachers Club; Mrs. Orville Routt, president of the Hollywood Woman's Club and member of the board of Scripps College of Pomona, will present highlights of her recent tour of the girls' schools of the east; Mrs. Gertrude Maynard, chairman of industrial and social relations, will speak on "Searching for the Romance in Industry." Mrs. Charles S. McKelvey, parliamentarian, will conduct the club institute at the usual hour.

The Boy's Glee Club of Pomona high school will render musical numbers on the program, and at 3 o'clock automobiles will take the club women to Pomona College at Claremont, where a 30-minute organ recital will be given in Bridges hall by Prof. Joseph Clokey, well known musical composer. Because of the fact that the Pomona high school auditorium will seat 2000, a general invitation is extended to all club women in the Los Angeles District and Southern District, Pomona being just over the line from this district. ## Wildcat Strikes Gas Sands Below Level of 1500 Ft.

Striking several good gas sands below the 1500-foot level, the Matteson No. 1 well of the Southern California Drilling Company in the Rancho Sausal district near Torrance is now down 2050 feet, according to E. W. Riggle, president of that company.

From present indications it is expected that a good showing of oil may be made between 3500 and 3500 feet deep.

The Southern California's recently acquired Evans well on the Lovelady pool, Signal Hill, is now bringing in 200 barrels a day of 25 and 26 gravity oil, Mr. Riggle also stated.

## Coast Business Prospect Bright Says Auto Head

Oakland District Manager Makes Survey of Conditions in California

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 5.—Quickened business in California, due to enormous crops—the mining industry prospering in Arizona, Nevada and Montana—lumbering showing remarkable activity in Washington and Oregon—this, together with a tremendous increase in the miles of good roads and a preponderant demand for closed cars, were the outstanding observations of C. W. Matheson, vice-president and director of sales of the Oakland Motor Car Company, who has just concluded a seven-weeks trip visiting the Oakland-Pontiac dealers in these states, according to a letter just received from him here by A. L. McMeans, district manager of the Oakland Motor Car Company.

"I got this impression not only from the dealers and executives of our own selling organization, but likewise from bankers, financial organizations, and chambers of commerce I visited," Matheson wrote. "The growth of good roads has been tremendous since I last visited the Pacific Coast, and this, together with the preponderant choice for closed cars, has materially flattened out the peaks in the selling seasons that were previously so noticeable in the motor car industry."

"There is every evidence of quickened business in California. The weather has been good, and consequently the crops are not only good but enormous. In Arizona, Nevada, Utah and Montana the mining industry is prospering, and in the northwest states of Washington and Oregon the lumber industry seems to be back again. In Iowa not only are the crops good but the increase in the number of roads has been enormous. In the majority of places I stopped I had to visit for more cars for our dealers," Matheson concluded. ## Meet Thursday for Sepulveda Blvd. Promotion

Will Circulate Petitions for Great Highway in Short Time

Preparatory to circulating petitions for the opening and paving of Sepulveda boulevard from Wilshire boulevard through the South Bay district to Long Beach, a committee representing El Segundo, Manhattan, Hermosa, Redondo and Torrance will meet in the Hermosa Beach Chamber of Commerce headquarters at 8 o'clock next Thursday night.

Sepulveda boulevard when completed will extend from the San Fernando Valley to Long Beach, following Arizona drive and Camino Real in traversing the El Segundo and South Bay district. The proceedings for the opening of the boulevard through Wilshire boulevard through the Santa Monica mountains to the San Fernando Valley have been virtually completed. The southern half of the boulevard is to be put in under the Mattson act. A committee representative of the cities along the route of the boulevard met in Torrance last Thursday.
