

nations a chance to increase importations and pay off their war debts to our country.

PROTECTIONISTS deny that lower schedules, especially for wool and sugar, would secure that result, as Cuba and Argentine, the principal exporters of sugar and wool, owe this country practically nothing.

So-called tinkering with the tariff might be extremely dangerous, as 65 percent of imports now come in duty-free, nearly one-half the import duties being to protect the farmer, such duties substantially increasing the prices received for farm products. One of our greatest "international bankers" is authority for the statement that the present tariff law, instead of stifling imports, has brought about an increase of 71 percent since it went into effect.

PRESIDENT COOLIDGE in his message to Congress stressed national economy as an ever- urgent need. The enormous revenues of the government are "a charge on all the people whether or not they directly pay taxes."

He takes the ground that whatever distress may exist for the farmers can be traced directly to inflation which followed the war. But he assertes that, with some exceptions as to localities and crops, "argiculture is continuing to make progress in recovering from the descention."


