THE PROPOSED GENERAL PETROLEUM PLANT
THE people of Torrance and particularly those who are members of organizations semi-official and official are wisely proceeding with open minds in regard to the proposed location of the General Petroleum Corporation's refinery in this city.

To secure a plant which would employ 3,500 men would mean a tremendous growth for this city, providing the plant in which they worked would not be so unpleasant as to discourage residence here.

It seems logical that science can find a way of capturing the vapors that rise from refineries to spread over surrounding territory. Petroleum experts say that it can be done; in a modern refinery not yet constructed.

Much of the trouble in Long Beach is due to the fact, it is said, that refineries east of that city turn waste water and oils into open ditches from which the unpleasant gases arise.

Yet all of these representations do not constitute a guarantee that the proposed General Petroleum refinery in Torrance would be the acme of desirability. It behooves Torrance to study the matter with the utmost care and exhaustiveness. Torrance has a brilliant future, one too bright to be spoiled by the location here of any industry that would drive residents away. At the same time Torrance does not want to drive away a large industry that is desirable.

Hasty action in the General Petroleum matter would bring nothing but regrets. The corporation has agreed to lay all the cards on the table before the community and believes that it can convince everyone that a modern refinery is not undesirable.

In considering the proposed location of the G. P. plant the company believes the best site would be near the extreme northern limits of Torrance, just south of 182nd street, which is the highway that intersects Western avenue at the Edison Company sub-station. Such a location would probably be the best from the standpoint of the City of Torrance as the prevailing winds are toward the east.

Torrance wants industries, but Torrance also wishes to maintain its integrity as a city of both industries and residents, to remain the MODERN industrial city in every sense of the word—a city that consists of people living in pleasant surroundings and gaining their livelihoods directly or indirectly from industries.

But if an industry which would drive residents away knocks at the door of Torrance that is another matter. We do not mean to present the case in a bad light for the General Petroleum Corporation. An interview with the executives of this company would convince the most skeptical o
