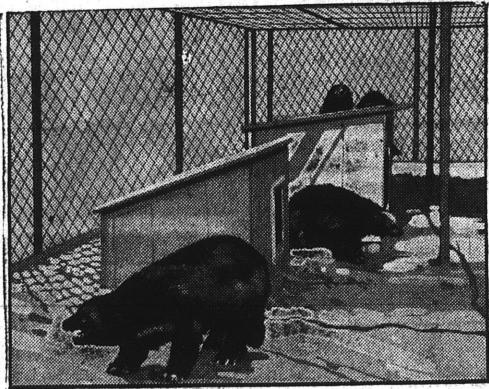

Reo Company Adopts Wolverine As Name for New Automobile

Michigan, motorland's center, not only is proud to be called "the Wolverine State," but can present conclusive proof of its right to bear the nickname. This fact is the outcome of the recent editorial controversy of national scope, in which it was asserted that the sobriquet "Wolverine State" could not be correctly applied to Michigan, since wolverines no longer inhabit the state. Answering the challenge, Michigan produced seven live wolverines—the property of the Detroit Zoological Gardens—as positive evidence that wolverines are really found within

its borders, although in captivity. Four of these wolverines are shown in the picture above.

In addition, Michigan residents pointed out that the name "Wolverine" has now acquired a definite meaning in Michigan's industrial life through the action of the Reo Motor Car Company, one of the oldest and most successful of Michigan's automobile manufacturers, in naming its newest pleasure car model "The Wolverine." Over hills and mountains, valleys, forests, plains, this court holds sway... and by the laws of nature it must be raining somewhere.

IT is too bad that Beveridge died before completing his Lincoln. He was putting into this work so much of thorough study and bringing to it such a vast store of knowledge of American history and issues that the work would undoubtedly have stood as the greatest opus in our vast Lincolnia, and a testimonial to one great American by another. Beveridge wished to leave his Lincoln to the world as the crowning achievement of his life. Death intervened. The loss is ours.

George says a guy in New York with a girl in California can get candy delivered here two hours before he orders it.

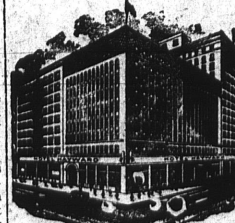
Rev. Tranchel to Speak at Keystone
