Flint, Mich., Aug. 25.—One of the severest tests ever imposed on a motor car came to light recently through R. O. Hamil, of Ludington, Mich., who wrote the Buick Motor Company here that a modified Ruick Sedan in his possession was doing satisfactory duty as a seventon truck, covering 140 miles each day with loads of logs.


