Pacific Electric Makes Proposals on Crossings Here

The Pacific Electric railway company has written the City Council concerning its estimates of the costs of improving crossings over the company's tracks on Cabrillo avenue, Redondo boulevard and Border avenue. The city has requested the railroad commission to grant the crossings. There are 26 crossings in all, including one at every intersection on the streets named above. According to the company the cost of the paving and the improvement of tracks at the crossings would be about \$37,795 of which the company would agree to pay \$9902, leaving \$27,893 for the city to pay.

The council believes that the commission will grant the crossings and allow the city to make the improvements over a period of years. The hearing on the request for the crossings will be held within a few weeks.

The P. E. letter said that the company has approved the construction of a spur track along Ferrocarril street from Plaza del Amo to Carson street. The installation of such a track would open up a new district for light industries in Torrance.

ASKS FOR LICENSE

A request for a business license to sell used cars and accessories at 1498 Cabrillo avenue was made of the City Council Tuesday night by A. B. Shaw. Decision was postponed pending investigation. The councilmen expressed themselves as unwilling to grant a permit if wrecked automobiles and parts are to be sold on the lot.

Three Millions Are Spent by P. E. in So. Calif. Last Year

More than \$3,000,000 was expended during the year just ended in additions and improvements to various properties on the Pacific Electric system, revealed an announcement today by W. W. Pontius, vice president and general manager of the local railway. As much or more will be necessary to provide for further planned improvements during 1928, Mr. Pontius added.

Outstanding in the improvements made in 1927 was the extremely large volume of trackage renewed, heavier and improved rail being used. Throughout the system a total of 26,400 feet was replaced, the bulk of it being the sturdy 128-pound type in place of 72-pound formerly used.

The erection of two major grade separations, Pico Street and Hyperion avenue, were the outstanding hazard removing additions during 1927. Four streets were separated by these two projects. Further safety measures were provided through the installation of 55 automatic wig-wags devices over the system, bringing the total to 555 now employed to warn of approaching trains.

New passenger station facilities were provided at the Hill street subway station, Santa Ana and Pasadena, while at Long Beach a pretentious new station is nearing completion. In addition numerous shelter stations were erected at various points over the system.

Other important improvements designed to improve the service were: New substation at San Gabriel; five deluxe motor coaches; overhead reconstruction and miscellaneous additions and improvements to bridges, buildings and other structures over the system.
