

By the terms of the Washington conference another conference on capital ship limitations will be called in 1931. Last week Great Britain addressed a note to the United States, Japan and France proposing reductions in capital ships before 1931. The proposals were as follows:

1—To reduce capital ships from 35,000 to 30,000 tons.

2—To reduce tagsic capital ship guns from-16 inches to 13 inches.

3—To extend the life of capital ships from 20 to 26 years.

* * *

On the face these proposals look reasonable. But quite correctly they fell on deaf ears in Washington.

Great Britain has Just completed two great new battleships. She now whishes to impose limitations on other powers so that they may not match her new floating forts. Acceptance of the new Britis proposals would do nothing but perpetuate the superiority of Great Britain in capital ships.

THE United States has no idea of war with Great Britain, but the United States must view with caution the moves which Great Britain makes to insure her continued superiority on the sea. It is a pity that organizations which blandly pass resolutions demanding that Congress accept every ostensibly peaceable move which comes from Europe do not study conditions with a little more care. No doubt many a group will read in the British proposals for further limitations an actual move toward peace, not realizing that it is in reality a move for continued British naval superiority.

Opponents of President Coolidge's naval program are backing Great Britain rather than the United States.

Mr. Gibson told Great Britain that we had no desire to engage in a naval construction race with the London government. He did say, however, that if such a race were started it might be of interest for Great Britain to know that our treasury bulged with \$300,000,000 surplus.
