Mr. Briney said that the brief was delivered Tuesday and that he had not had time to study it carefully. The Council delayed action, giving Mr. Jensen to understand that no police power would be invoked pending a decision.

Crossing Over Tracks Are Accepted By Council Tuesday Night

The final link in the chain of crossings over Pacific Electric rights-of-way in Torrance was forged Tuesday night when the City Council received and accepted easements over the tracks at thirty-six intersections in Torrance. The easements were granted after an uncontested hearing before the Railroad Commission. Any improvements of the crossings must be made by the city. The acceptance of the easements ended a series of negotiations on the matter between city officials and railway executives lasting over a period of more than a year. The most important crossings over which easements were granted are on Cabrillo avenue, Redondo boulevard, Border avenue and the intersection of Border with the tracks near Post avenue.

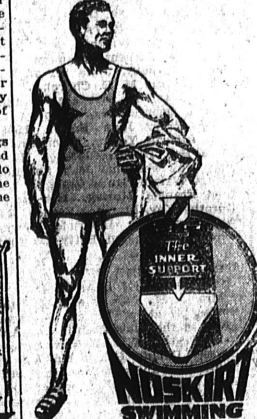
Legion Is Granted Firework Permit

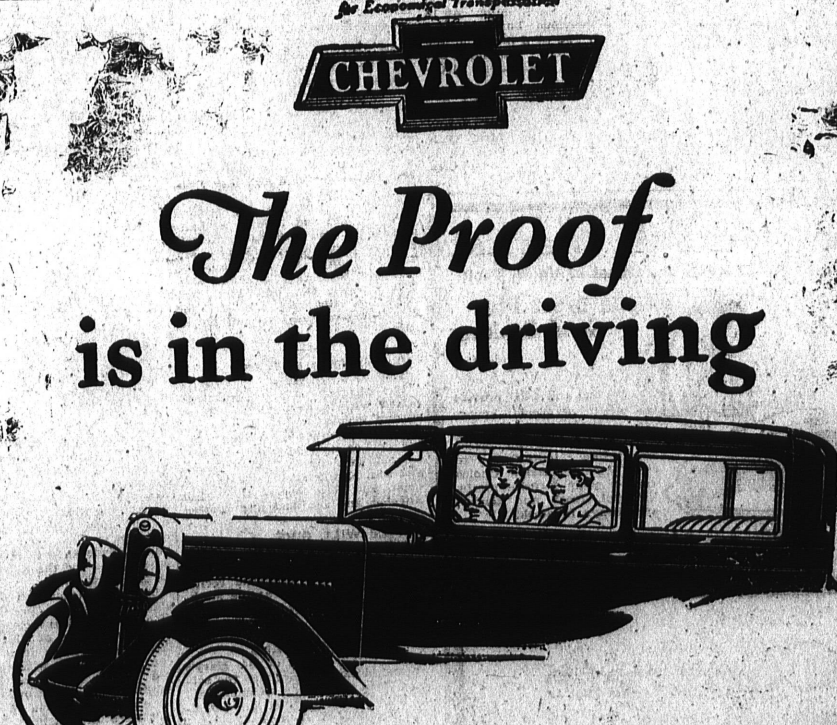
