REDONDO SUGGESTS CONSOLIDATION

Direct feelers have been put out from Redondo Direct feelers have been put out from Redondo Beach to ascertain how Torrance would like to con-solidate with that municipality. Some months ago a committee from the Redondo Chamber of Commerce visited Torrance to sound out opinion on the subject. A few days ago a Redondo Beach city official ap-proached a Torrance city official on the subject. The Herald believes it reflects the sense of the peo-ple of Torrance when it says that Torrance at this time would not look with favor on such a project. The reasons entering into such a disinclination are largely economic.

reasons entering into such a disinclination are largely Conomic. The tax rate in Redondo Beach is high. That of Torrance is low. Redondo is burdened with a heavy bonded indebtedness. Torrance owes only about \$42,-000. The assessed valuation of Redondo is only about one quarter that of Torrance. Consolidation of Tor-rance and Redondo would cost Torrance money. At the same time the benefits to be derived from a linking of the two cities would be negligible. However, it is obvious that co-operation between the two municipalities is desirable. Torrance and Re-dondo should be friendly neighbors. Their interests are identical. As this territory grows and develops both cities will prosper. We see no reason, however, why they cannot pros-per as well by maintaining their individual identities as they can by merging. As a matter of fact it is plain to us that Torrance would lose rather than gain through any such move. This plan is note of our busi-ness in Torrance. At the same time it is obvious that those three cities have common interests which should tend to draw them together. Naturally each is moti-vated by local patriotism and before any success crowns the efforts of the consolidationists many a lo-cal wrinkle must be ironed out. Mantime Torrance with the second lowest tax rate in Los Angeles county and one of the lowest in the state, Torrance humming with industries and standing at the threshold of a great industrial, residential and commercial development will do best to paddle its own cance.






