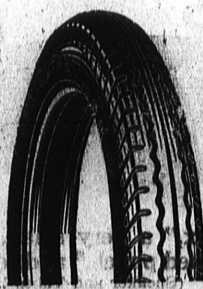

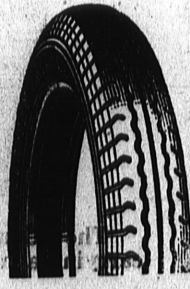

Good Things We Like
THOSE who are fond of tomatoes will enjoy this dish.
Portuguese Tomatoes—Provide two cupsful of cooked meat—sliced the ham once in this sauce. Serve with seedless oranges sliced thin and dressed with a sugar syrup prepared by rubbing two cubes of sugar over a lemon and then adding the juice of the lemon; when dissolved add a fourth of a teaspoonful of salt, one eighth of a teaspoonful of pepper and let the slices stand in sauce for half an hour before serving.

Alabamian Ham—Select a thick slice of ham cut from the center of a large ham. Peel the ham for a few minutes, wipe dry, and broil to a delicate brown. Lay on a hot platter and pour over it one tablespoonful of lemon juice mixed with two tablespoonfuls of hot water and a teaspoonful of sugar. Turn the ham once in this sauce. Serve with seedless oranges sliced thin and dressed with a sugar syrup prepared by rubbing two cubes of sugar over a lemon and then adding the juice of the lemon; when dissolved add a fourth of a teaspoonful of salt, one eighth of a teaspoonful of pepper and let the slices stand in sauce for half an hour before serving.

Turkish Pilau—Take a pound and half of the shoulder of lamb, cut into serving sized pieces. Place the meat in a kettle, cover with three cupsful of boiling water and add one and one-half teaspoonfuls of salt and a teaspoonful of chili powder, bring to the boiling point and skim, then simmer one hour. Pour the broth into a double boiler and add one cupful of uncooked rice and one-half cupful of currants; cook until tender. Meanwhile melt four tablespoonfuls of drippings, lay in the cooked meat and brown slowly. Place the meat around with cooked rice. Saffron and cardamom seeds may be used in place of the chili if so desired.
