Court Decision Favors Ramage

Judge Walter S. Gates in superior court Wednesday dissolved the restraining order brought by A. A. Germain, asking that the city council be not allowed to devote city funds to employ counsel to fight the recall, now pending in the courts, against Robert C. Ramage.

This brings to a close the attempt on the part of several citizens to have the council restrained in the payment of \$500 to Louis Greenbaum for services rendered in recall work and \$250 appropriated for another attorney to assist Greenbaum. It is said there is no appeal from this decision of the judge.

The mandamus suit initiated by the complaint of Lloyd F. Jones to compel the Hawthorne city council to call a special election to vote upon the recall of Councilman Robert Ramage, has again been set for the calendar of the superior court, this time for Monday, October 29, at 10 a. m. Intimation has been given by City Attorney Greenbaum that a demurrer will again be filed to the amended complaint which will undoubtedly cause additional delay in the hearing of the case.

Former Bank Official Faces New Charges

E. J. Young, former president of the National Bank of Hermosa Beach, recently tried in Federal Court on charges of misapplication of bank funds, has been taken into custody by deputy sheriffs charged with grand theft as a result of assertedly fraudulent note deals in Santa Monica, Norris G. Stensland, head of the sheriff's burglary investigation detail announced, yesterday, according to the Los Angeles Times.

The jury that heard Young's trial in federal court disagreed and he is scheduled to be tried again in December. L. E. Spencer, another official of the bank tried with Young, was acquitted. George B. Clark, Santa Monica broker, and Luella Smith, former housekeeper for Young, were arrested with Young. The trio is accused of obtaining \$500 from the Marine Bank of Santa Monica and \$2000 from Duff Wilson, manager of the Cloyer Field Airport, by offering assertedly fictitious notes as security.

According to Deputy Sheriffs Quahy and Slough, who made the arrests, Young, Mrs. Smith and Clark passed the notes signed, C. E. Smith, the name of Mrs. Smith's husband who died in Seattle in 1908, stating that the maker of the note was wealthy Lancaster banker.

Finally at the sheriff's office this morning elicits the information that Young gave bonds October 15 and was released.
