Baptist Minister Is Ordained at Keystone

H. B. Tranchel Pastor for Four Years Receives Holy Orders

An ordination service for H. B. Tranchel of the Keystone Baptist church was held Thursday at the church here on Dolores street. Twenty-four Baptist churches of the Los Angeles Association were represented by forty-six delegates. A regular ordination council was declared with Dr. J. A. V. Pieters of Inglewood, clerk; Dr. John Snape, moderator; Rev. Geo. C. Wright, interrogator; Dr. W. J. Harper and Dr. J. B. Fox, denominational executive secretaries, as an examining board. Mr. Tranchel read his convention, call to the ministry, and views of Bible doctrine and was examined and questioned by the various ministers present. Dr. E. T. Cassell of Highland Park led in singing his own composition, "Loyalty to Christ." The examining board unanimously voted to hold the ordination service at 7 o'clock. The ministers and delegates were served with a dinner at 5 o'clock in Boosters' Hall on Main street by the ladies of the church.

The evening service was opened by singing by the congregation followed by prayer by Dr. J. A. V. Pieters; song "Jesus Loves Me," by Dorothy Jane Tranchel and Phyllis Howe; violin solo, "Nearer My God to Thee," by Adelle Tomlin, accompanied at the piano by Mrs. Tranchel; sermon by Dr. George C. Wright, pastor of the Los Angeles Baptist Church in Los Angeles, in charge to the church by Rev. John B. Speed; charge to the candidate by Rev. Ira Fox of Compton; welcome into the Baptist ministry by Rev. A. V. Marsh of Gardena; ordination prayer by Dr. George F. Holt; presentation of bouquet of flowers from the Central Baptist church of Los Angeles and benediction by Rev. H. B. Tranchel.

Mr. Tranchel was preceded in the ministry by his father who was engaged in the Baptist ministry for 58 years having charges in different middle western states. Mr. Tranchel who has been a resident for several years of Lomita became interested in a Sunday school here five years ago. At that time services were held in the open and after six months church services were conducted in Boosters' Hall on Main street, followed by services being held at the home of Mrs. M. E. Nidever on Dolores street. In 1924 the present church was erected on Dolores street and Mr. Tranchel has been the pastor. He has worked intently in the years past and will endeavor to build up his congregation as the community grows.

Mines Field Loses Dirigible Plant

Chances of the Goodyear dirigible plant for the construction of the two huge airships and other lighter than air craft for the United States navy locating here, have for the present gone a-glimmering, according to the report brought back to Los Angeles Tuesday by Councilman Wm. G. Bonelli, and Secretary Arnoll of the Los Angeles chamber of commerce.

While the dirigible plant to build the navy craft will be placed in Akron, Ohio, hope is held out by the Goodyear company that they still expect to locate a dirigible factory on the Pacific coast, and that they regard Mines field as the logical and most suitable place. The Pacific Coast factory for which there are as yet no plans, will be for the purpose of producing commercial craft, which the Goodyear company believes will be in great demand within the near future.

The fact that Mines field is on leased rather than city owned property is ascribed by Goodyear officials as the reason why they would not place the dirigible plant here. They stated they could not locate a \$2,000,000 plant adjacent to a leased field, on account of the lack of assurance as to its permanency.

Lower P. E. Fares to Beach Cities

HERMOSA BEACH REVIEW. Labors of the mayors and city councils of Hermosa, Manhattan and other South Bay cities in an effort to secure lower rates have borne fruit in more ways than one. In addition to the securing of a bus service for the south bay district which will give us a rate of 15 cents to Manchester and Vermont avenues and thus a rate of 22 cents to downtown Los Angeles, which it is expected will be inaugurated soon, it has resulted in a lowering of the Pacific Electric rate. Commuters will be able to purchase weekly passes at the rate of \$2.75 instead of the monthly fare of \$18.00, which will result in a saving to the passenger of \$2 a month.

Harbor Commission Cuts Down Expense

WILMINGTON PRESS. Attributing the act to the institution of a sweeping policy of economy, the board of harbor commissioners Wednesday removed from office Franklin K. Cole, for the past 18 months general manager of the commission. At the same time the body voted to unite that post with the position of harbor controller, reduced the salary of Traffic Manager J. G. Starr and ordered a payroll reduction of 20 per cent in the engineering department. By this move a saving in excess of \$10,000 a year, will be effected, the commission announced. Cole's salary was \$12,000 a year, but Edwards, controller, was receiving \$6000 a year. In the dual role of manager and controller he will receive \$6000, thus effecting a saving of \$6000 a year by uniting the two posts. Starr's salary will be reduced from \$8500 to \$7200 a year.

Big Building Boom Recorded in October

COMPTON NEWS-TRIBUNE. October building in Compton totaled \$177,630 and brought the year's total up to \$1,219,890. There were 40 permits and the year's permits now number 805.

Last year at this time the total for the year was but \$675,548, and the total for October was but \$41,690.

Building Inspector Park estimates that of the 605 permits issued at least 450 have been for dwelling houses and apartments and that the population of Compton has increased by probably 2,000 in the ten months of the year as a result of this building.

Many Traffic Arteries to Harbor Planned

WILMINGTON PRESS

As the business of Los Angeles harbor increases in volume the highways leading to and from this port have been taxed to the limit as transportation arteries, and therefore, other boulevards and wider avenues seem necessary to transport shipping.

Wilmington is awake to these needs and more and wider highways are the topics that receive special consideration from the chamber of commerce with its several subsidiary committees.

Wilmington is most interested in Avalon boulevard, a new shorter route to the Los Angeles commercial district. This highway is expected to be completed and opened within the next six months.

Starting at the Catalina Terminal, Avalon boulevard merges with San Pedro street in Los Angeles, continuing through the wholesale district to its end at Aliso street, within a block of the new Los Angeles City Hall.

Avalon is paved south from Los Angeles to 16th street, half way to Wilmington. From Wilmington it is paved north to Rocha street and concrete is now being poured in the section between Rocha and Carson streets. The remaining three and a half mile section will be paved in the near future as a cash job, which will greatly expedite the work.

Plans for the opening of Figueroa street will be handled by the county both in the city and county sections. All plans for this work from Los Angeles south to Reyes, the north city limits of Wilmington, are now complete. Field work has been done and plans are being prepared for the highway through this city, over Machado street.

Proceedings are now under way for a large section of Normandie avenue. This city is preparing to widen Amaranth street from Weston to 25th in Harbor City and to open and pave this street from 26th to Anaheim boulevard.

Rochea, when completed, will be the principal route from Long Beach to Redondo. It is a continuation of Willow street, Long Beach and has recently been improved to Harbor boulevard, or Main street. The county has started the work of continuing it west, it will run due west to Figueroa, and northwest to merge with 228th street just west of Western avenue.

This will be a link in Sepulveda boulevard, which is designed to be a "by-pass" route avoiding all cities and towns. Skirting Redondo, it will continue north, west of Hollywood and through Sepulveda Canyon to connect with Ventura boulevard and the coast route north.

O and N will be linked by a diagonal connection between Leocovure and Sanford avenues. This highway will join State street in Long Beach.

Rossie was wading into the surf near the giant dipper, fully clothed, when Block who was walking down the beach, noticed his actions. He immediately dashed into the ocean after the man and a battle ensued, Block finally overpowering Rossie and dragging him ashore.

After having been given a change of clothing and restoratives, he was questioned by Chief of Police Peterson and Rossie stated that he had been living on a ranch near Gardena and had served during the World War as an officer in the German army, having been wounded. He gave as reason for his actions the fact that he wanted to join his parents, both of whom have been dead for some year. He was carrying over sixty dollars in currency. Rossie will probably be sent to the psychopathic ward of the general hospital for observation.
