Hawthorne Recall Case Will Be Heard in Superior Court, Ruling

Hawthorne—The mandamus case against the Hawthorne city council apparently will be heard in the superior court on its merits. Judge Walter S. Gates has overruled City Attorney Greenbaum's last demurrer to the complaint asking a court order for an election to vote on the Ramage recall. City Attorney Greenbaum has filed his answer with the court and the issue of calling the election will be tried on that answer. The court has not yet set a time for hearing the case but in all probability it will be within a few days.

The city attorney's answer is cast in legal verbiage, occupying four typewritten pages. Stripped of its phraseology it denies that the recall petition is signed by 25 per cent of voters at precedent election; denies mishandling of the city's affairs by Councilman Ramage; or that he has invoked personal animosity, or that he is incompetent; denies that the petition contains the residence and occupation of the signers; denies that some of the affidavits as to circulation of petitions were made by qualified electors; alleges that the city at the time of the filing of the petition was without a city clerk; alleges that prior to the clerk's departure he did, "without authorization of law appoint one Helen Lehne as city clerk; that she was not qualified to hold the

Estimates Ready on Vermont Job

Gardena.—According to information just received by J. J. Bruckshaw, president of the Gardena Valley Chamber of Commerce, the county road department, acting under instructions from Supervisor McClellan, has completed its estimate of the cost of grading and paving Vermont avenue in the block between Spencer and Palm. Their estimate on this part of the work is \$5,000.

This estimate, however, takes no account of the cost of moving the tracks to the middle of the street or acquiring the Pacific Electric right-of-way in order to widen Vermont and open up the bottleneck. The cost of moving the tracks will have to be estimated by the F. E. according to the road department officials and the value of the right-of-way will have to be determined by an appraisal. It is the conclusion of citizens here who are familiar with the proposition that a conservative estimate of the cost of the entire improvement from Spencer to 16th street would be approximately \$60,000.—Gardena Valley News.

Sanitary Sewers in Hawthorne Voted

Hawthorne—After some verbal protests on the part of citizens present, the city council Monday evening passed a resolution of intention for the installation of sanitary sewers in all the half of the city north of Ballona avenue. The resolution and the preceding motion ordering the engineer to bring in the plans and specifications, and in the plans accepting the plans were passed by a three to two vote. Ramage, Breen and Fraser voting in the affirmative, with Clarke and Reese in opposition to each step of the sewer procedure.

The sewer matter was opened early in the evening with the calling for City Engineer J. C. Hewitt's report on his estimate of the cost of the sewers. Mr. Hewitt's report filed with the council placed the cost of the job at \$249,812 instead of \$262,681, the estimate which had been made by former City Engineer Frank N. Huddleson, an apparent saving of \$12,872. Mr. Hewitt explained his figures by stating that sewer contractors are in intense competition at the present time and are bidding lower than ever before, and while he believed the city would receive a bid as low or lower than his estimate, the price of \$262,681 estimated by Mr. Huddleson was undoubtedly very near correct for the date when the former estimate was made as sewer contractors were going somewhat higher at that time. Mr. Hewitt stated further that the plans called for vitrified clay pipe, and that in many places concrete pipe could be substituted, which would make a further saving of \$4000 or \$5000 possible.

Incidentally Mr. Hewitt gave his entire approval to the sewer design, informing the council that in his judgment it was in every way a good one.—Hawthorne-Lennox Advertiser.

Another Step Taken in Completing L. A.-to-Seaport Highway

Wilmington—Another step has been completed in the opening and paving of Avalon Boulevard to make it the shortest route between Wilmington and Los Angeles. Saturday a strip approximately one mile long, extending north from Rocha street, was opened for traffic.

Silk Mills Co. in Hermosa Reformed

Hermosa Beach—At the annual meeting of the stockholders of the Golden State Silk Mills, Inc., last Friday a plan of reorganization was decided upon which has been authorized by the stockholders. A new company is being formed under the laws of Nevada, which will take over the assets and liabilities of the old corporation, under a new name, capitalization to be the same as at present, except that the stock will be divided into 750,000 shares of preferred stock of a par value of \$1 a share, and 250,000 shares of common stock without valuation, present holders of stock to receive one share of preferred stock in the new corporation for every two shares they now hold, and one share of common stock for every eight shares they now hold.—Hermosa Beach Review.
