In the house shown above one can see at a slance that both of these qualities—old English charm modern American convenience— have been preserved and united with real success.

Nor is this house expensive to build. A proper distribution of the masses, careful roof treatment and study of the details permit a charming exterior with a most economical plan—the ideal home.

The construction is of frame with stucco finish except the front wall of the living room which is of brick.

The house measures 40 feet 6 incides in width including the garage, so a lot with a frontage of not less than 50 feet should be provided.

A cellar extends under the full house and provides the laundry, heater space and such.
