Gardena Judge Hands Torrance Man Hard Jolt

Mexican Draws Sentence for Reckless Driving; Deportation Is Urged

GARDENA. — Yiquela Cirda of Torrance was handed 90 days in jail, a fine of \$100 and an additional penalty of one day for each \$1.00 of the fine if he is not able to pay the \$100, by Judge Crandell in justice court, Tuesday morning and a recommendation that he be deported from the United States to his native country, Mexico, at the end of his sentence. Cirda was charged with reckless driving, after he had run into and knocked down L. H. Balsley, age 71 of 1641 Euclid, Torrance.

The accident occurred Saturday evening, November 3 between 8 and 9 o'clock at the corner of Palm and Western avenue. Mr. Balsley was crossing Western avenue from the pedestrian zone when he was struck and dragged for considerable distance by the Ford touring car driven by Cirda. Mr. Balsley testified Mr. Balsley was badly bruised and skinned. He has been a resident of Moneta for ten years and is well known.

C. A. Stokes acted as interpreter for Cirda, who is not a citizen of the United States but who has been a resident of this country for the past 14 years. He did not have a driver's license. He was driving his brother's car.—Gardena Valley News.

McClellan Majority Largest He Ever Received in Contested Vote, Completed Official Count Shows

Official complete returns tabulated at Registrar Kerr's office and including ballots cast by absent voters show that Supervisor R. F. McClellan was re-elected by the greatest majority he ever obtained in a contested election.

In 1916 when he first ran for supervisor, Mr. McClellan received a majority of 6486. In 1920 he won by a margin of 7115. In 1924 his opponent, Mayor Peck of Compton, died shortly after the primary. This year the McClellan majority was 7181.

The official count was as follows: McClellan, 7688; Houck, 6554. Eighty seven per cent of the absent vote was for McClellan.

Dick Smith Writes Englishmen Puzzled Over American Issues

R. R. Smith, of the National Supply Company, Union Tool Division, who is in England managing the company's plant there writes interestingly of his activities in the western part of "the tight little island of Great Britain."

Mr. Smith with David Faulkner, president of the Union Tool recently attended a meeting of a Rotary Club in England. Mr. Faulkner was introduced as a distinguished visitor and Mr. Smith as a member of the Rotary Club of Torrance, California, U. S. A.

Rotarians, including many "Sirs" were tremendously interested in the recent national elections in the United States and called upon Mr. Smith to outline the issues, which he did. He writes too that Englishmen generally are more interested in the working out of prohibition in this country than in almost any other subject affecting the United States.

He writes that Englishmen cannot understand any of the American viewpoints regarding prohibition. He says they hear that enforcement in large cities over here is more or less of a joke and cannot understand why the people continue the law in force if this be true.

Mr. Smith writes that there is much misunderstanding of America by Englishmen and says these erroneous impressions can be wiped out only through personal contact. He expresses the belief that acquaintance between Americans and Englishmen would create a new understanding between the two nations, which now seem to be drifting further and further apart.

The National Supply factory which Mr. Smith is now managing is located in western England, in territory where Mr. Smith's ancestors lived. He has visited many relatives while there.
