First National Thrift Club for Young Men, Plan Meeting to Organize Will Be Held Here Tonight at 7 o'Clock

Following the precedent set by Ventura, and numerous other communities, the First National Bank of Torrance is attempting to establish here what will be known as a thrift club for young men of the community.

A meeting of all the young men of the district under 21 years of age, who will be interested in the club, will be held tonight at 7 o'clock at Earl's Cafe.

There will be a dinner preceding the meeting, after which there will be a discussion of the purpose of the club, and primary steps to organization will be taken.

Elwood Lloyd IV, who has had much experience in organizing thrift clubs throughout Southern California, will be the speaker of the evening.

Thrift clubs are being established to teach young men to save consistently, and to give them a thorough practical knowledge of business tactics and investments.

Work within the organization will be done entirely by the group within the thrift club, the bank itself not taking an active part in the affairs of the group operations, but always ready to aid, counsel and assist where it may do so.

This is to be a wonderful opportunity for Torrance young men to become familiar with saving and investing money. The plan has been broached to many of the prominent business men, and they have been quite enthusiastic over the idea.

(Continued from Page 1) Pointing out that the automobile has created a tremendous demand for emergency treatment, Dr. Pomeroy said that such treatment is always available at a health center.

"Persons injured in automobile accidents," he said, "are at least temporarily dependents. They are given emergency treatment at the health centers by physicians who are able to pay their fees are required to do so."

Dr. Pomeroy made clear that the main purpose of the health center is one of prevention. He declared that large corporations have discovered it is more economical to spend money in the prevention of disease than in its cure or control.

Herbert Wood, principal of the High School asserted that the establishment of a health center in Torrance would be of inestimable assistance to the schools.

After the meeting Dr. Pomeroy and a committee of the Chamber of Commerce, led by Harry H. Dolley, chamber of commerce president, who presided at the luncheon made a trip of inspection to proposed sites in Torrance. Dr. Pomeroy said that it would probably be a year before work could start on a health center, provided the board of supervisors decides on Torrance as the location.
