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Club Hears Talk on Charity Work

Mrs. F. J. Spring Gives Women Figures on County Aid

From reports given at the Women's club Wednesday it was shown that 80 per cent of those receiving relief from Los Angeles county were of the itinerant class and that 60 per cent of these were from Mexico. These facts were brought out in the talk of Mrs. F. J. Spring, president of the Women's Social Service club and Mrs. John Rush in her report of a meeting of the philanthropic section of the federation.

Mrs. Spring, who was speaker of the afternoon spoke of the work of her club in helping people who were in need to help themselves and told of a number of instances where people were placed on their feet by a little aid from the club. Mrs. Spring also told of the Key home that is on display at the Architects' building, Fifth and Figueroa streets, Los Angeles. Nothing is for sale here but there are on exhibition plans for home furnishings, styles of plumbing and a great many other things that go to make a comfortable, livable home.

There was to have been a display of heirlooms but it must have been forgotten by the members as only a few were brought. Among them were silver candle snuffers, silver thread reel, silver spoons and a pressed glass cup plate. All of these things, with the exception of the cup plate dated from 1700, the cups date is known to have been in one family since 1780, but is supposed to be older than that.

Mrs. Frank Sammons spoke of the new race of American cystitis that is growing up in this country. They are the children of the auto camps who know no home but the auto camp and an old Ford car. These children are receiving but very little schooling, as they stay in one auto camp until the time limit of such residence is reached, nearly always two weeks, and then move on to another.

A letter from the federation was read in regard to the type of building used for schools for the children of the itinerant laborer who follows the fruit season from one end of the state to the other. These children receive but little schooling, as in many places the school board will not receive them into their schools and the school for them is held in any building convenient, sometimes old cow barns, poorly lighted, badly ventilated and totally unfit are used.

Mrs. B. O. Buxton gave a very interesting report of the presidents' council held at Huntington Park last week. She also reported on the conference of the drama section of the district.

Mrs. Buxton has been appointed by the executive board as parliamentarian to take the place of Mrs. F. L. Parks who resigned.
