only a few months ago he was murdered by a fanatical revolutionist.

Did Obregon concoct the charges against Gomez and Serrano in order to insure his own election without opposition? Many think so. We do not know.

Did Calles, jealous of Obregon, have a hand in the death of his friend? Many say so, though the facts seem to run against the contention.

Obregon dead, Calles adhering to the constitution provision against successive terms, Portes Gil became provisional president, to serve until the next election.

THIS week there broke over the troubled Republic once more the rumbling thunder of another revolution.

Say the revolutionists: "Gil is the tool of Calles, who still is virtual president. Calles killed Obregon. Therefore Calles must go."

Once more blood must be let as Mexico, torn by a century old feud between liberal and reactionary thought, strives pitifully, blindly toward her destiny.

Leave out the greedy ambitions of individual Mexican leaders, so many of whom, have sanctioned and ordered murder in order to use corpses as stepping-stones to their own selfishness. These are the by-products of the deeper clash between conflicting ideas, rooted far down in the heart of Mexico.

EVERY revolution since the dashing Hidalgo fired the souls of his countrymen against the oppression of Spain has been built upon one or another of these two clashing modes of thought.

On the one hand—liberalism—the separation of church and state, complete freedom from feudal overlordship, true democracy.

On the other hand—the striving of the church for its former powerful position, the refusal of the wealthy to give up their lands and holdings and surrender overlordship—both based on the contention that illiterate Mexico is not ready for self-government.

Underneath all the pronouncements of revolutionists and counter-revolutionists run the threads of one of these patterns. Since Carranza every president has been of the liberal school—and almost every revolution has been shaped in the image of the conservatives.

WITH varying degrees a Mexican is either radical or retrograde. Mingle the conflict between these two violently opposed schools of thought with a population steeped in ignorance, add greed of individuals, pour in memory of three-hundred years of exploitation and oppression under Spain and stir with the hatred aroused by former revolutions and murder and you have a perfect recipe for almost incessant turmoil.

TRULY Mexico is to be more pitied than despised. The great wonder is not that Mexicans are illiterate but that they have developed any hint of national consciousness; not that leaders are murdered but that any leader remains alive; not that the stark specter of revolution so frequently stalks through the valleys and over the plateaus, but that peace ever settles down to reign even temporarily.

THROUGH all the bloody, romantic hot and sizzling history of the Republic historians discern a constant thread of progress.

When in the furnace of civil war the reactionaries become a little more liberal and the radicals a little more conservative then and then alone, it seems, can Mexico emerge from her present status. It will probably be a long time. The heavy hand of centuries-old authority is not easily loosened from the throat of a country so potentially rich. Man wins to higher levels of civility, society and economics only through generations of travail.

Let us hope, though the hope at times seems dim, that the past short hundred years of turmoil in the house next door are but the labor pains of a nation agonized in the slow birth of a new destiny.

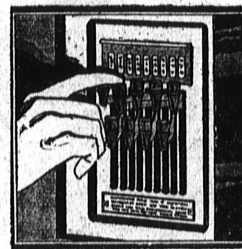

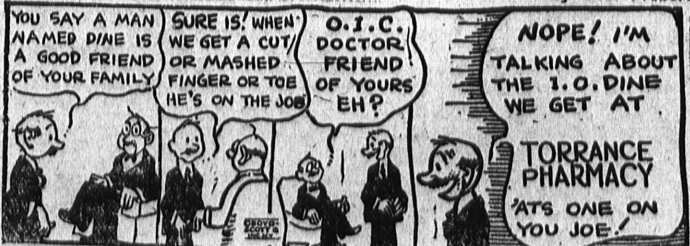
