Hints to Flower Show Winners

Committee Gives Suggestion on What to Plant and When to Plant—Prize Lists Ready

Hints for flower growers who wish to have their flowers in bloom and their best in time to exhibit bloom at the Second Annual American Legion Flower Show to be held July 26-27, were given out this week by the committee:

To have gladiolus to exhibit, plant your bulbs about May 1. To keep them now, put the bulbs in a cool, dry, dark place, and right side up. If they sprout a little in that position, it will not affect their growing or blooming qualities.

For dahlias to exhibit during the show, they must be planted soon. Suggestion is made to send to Richard Diener at Oxnard, California, asking for his booklet on the planting of dahlias and petunia seeds.

Seeds to be planted in flats now, and transplanted later are dahlia, California giant asters, Giants of California, zinnias. Ready to plant in the open now are the Campfire or Sensation calendula, dahlia tubers, fistulosa type African marigold, Drummondii Phlox,

scabiosa and the marionum snap-dragon. Prizes are to be offered at the coming show for the best blooms of these flowers exhibited.

The prize list and schedule is now ready and lists have been mailed out to all Garden Club members and others interested. Copies may be had from R. J. Deisinger at the First National Bank, Mrs. Jamieson at the Library, King's Nursery and C. B. Bell.

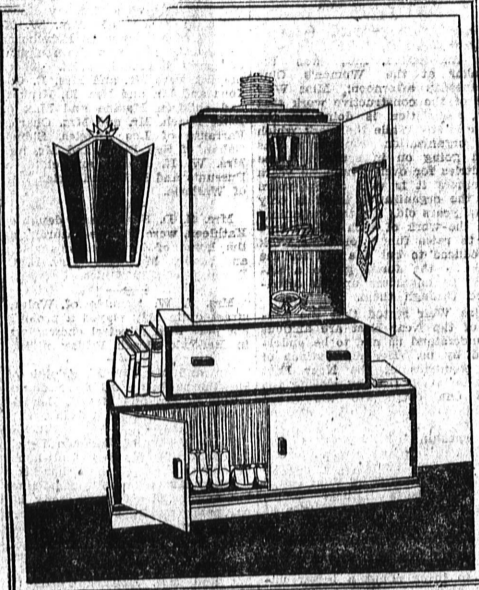
Rev. "Bob" Shuler's Associate to Speak in Torrance Sunday

CONCEALED CUPBOARDS IN paneled WALLS CONVENIENCE REIGNS SUPREME



Instead of scattering a collection of glass and china all over the residence, the occupants of the house, of which a part of the living room is sketched above, conceived the idea of incorporating display shelves into the walls of the paneled living room in such a way that the doors of the cases formed part of the wall paneling. In this way, they do not keep the collection constantly on display and always running the risk of careless handling destroying irreplaceable pieces.

By an ingenious arrangement the doors of these cabinets open by a turn of a key in an inconspicuous lock placed in what would at first appear to be an electric light socket set into the baseboard. The lock releases the catches, and the doors, subject to strong springs, open automatically. While the type of paneling shown in this room lends itself extremely well to the manner in which it is employed, there is no reason why any other sort of paneling could not as successfully conceal cupboard doors.

A MODERN CHEST HOUSES A WARDROBE



That modern apartments are a fact of one's ingenuity is a well known truth. When your home is not even an apartment, but merely one large room, with kitchenette and bath and no closet space at all, decoration becomes a problem indeed.

However, with a chest such as is illustrated in the sketch shown above, one need not despair. Life will seem less complex and crowded to be sure. This chest stands five feet two and a half inches from the floor, is fifteen and a quarter inches deep and has a base that measures four feet across. The bottom compartment is a splendid place for shoes and slippers; as it permits them to be placed neatly side by side. A shelf to divide this space in two would take care of another row of neatly ranged shoes. A board down the center or to one side would allow

tall boots to be stood in this compartment, and would separate the chest from the wall, as it were. The middle drawer which is built in a manner that reminds one of the skyscraper of today is a large and commodious one that easily accommodates the overflow of the upper shelves. The three shelves of the upper part of this chest take care of shirts, collars, ties (on a rack on the back of the doors) handkerchiefs, et cetera.

This good looking piece of furniture may be had in walnut, mahogany, maple or oak, finished in a walnut or mahogany stain or lacquered chartreuse green with silver leaf trim if this happens to suit your color scheme. If not, any combination of colors that harmonizes with the other pieces in the room and the surroundings may be selected.
