### Bishop Stevens Officiates Here

Christ Episcopal Church Opened at Services on Palm Sunday

"Jesus Christ, the Same Yesterday, Today and Forever," was the text chosen by the Right Rev. W. Bertrand Stevens, bishop of Los Angeles for his sermon at the opening of the new Christ Episcopal church Sunday afternoon. He stated that all of those present over to who had studied geography when young thought then that it was an unchangeable fact but geography has changed, so have conventions about fact but these have changed greatly in the past few years. Still Jesus has remained the same unchangeable Jesus. His influence has remained the same. The conclusive proof of His divinity is His unchangeableness through the ages. Take Jesus out of the world and it will change. Our allegiance to Jesus is greater than any we can offer to any temporal ruler. In the changeableness of Christ stands the changelessness of the world. Worship of the changeless Christ gives us stability. We witness not to our own industry and we witness not to our own devotion but we witness to Him who is the same yesterday, today and forever. While we are not able to consecrate this church building just now we dedicate it a witness of the unchangeable Christ.

The Rev. Harold H. Kelley, vicar of Christ church, under whose charge the building was erected read the opening sentences of the service and spoke a few words of appreciation to those who had helped make it possible.

Rev. Thomas P. Swift of Wilmington read the psalms. Mr. Swift was in charge at the time of the building of the Parish Hall where for the past four years services have been held.

Rev. Dr. H. P. James of Redondo Beach read the scripture lesson from the twenty-first chapter of Revelations beginning at the tenth verse. Dr. James was in charge of the services at the church three years ago.

Rev. M. K. Crawford of Los Angeles who is known as the "engineering missionary" read the prayers and led in the stating of the creed. Mr. Crawford was in charge of the actual construction of the building.

The vested choir of St. Peter's church San Pedro, led in the singing of the hymns. The processional hymn was "All Glory, Laud and Honor to The Redeemer King." Other hymns were "O, Jesus Thou Art Standing Outside the Fast Closed Door," "The Church's One

Foundation is Jesus Christ Our Lord," and the recessional: "Hail On, Ride On in Majesty." The choir also sang the offertory anthem, "Frank Guise" of San Pedro was at the organ.

Before the sermon Bishop Stevens consecrated gifts for the use of the new church. Several more gifts having been given since last week. Among them are a fair linen cloth for the altar, by Mrs. W. T. Klumman; communion linens, by Mrs. Helman of St. Michael's parish, Anaheim; sanctuary candles, by Mrs. Katharine Davis of Los Angeles; and a beautiful white marble stone to mark the corner of the building by Moralee-Scott of San Pedro. This stone was blessed by the bishop before the service.

At the close of the sermon the bishop lighted the candles on the altar.

Five of the fifteen present at the first Episcopal church service held in Torrance on September 27, 1919 were present at the service Sunday afternoon. They were Mrs. Phoebe Sykes, Mrs. J. O. Moore, Mrs. Jas. H. Milburn, Will Sykes and Robert Nourse.

The church was beautifully decorated with palm branches on Sunday is observed in the Episcopal church on Palm Sunday in commemoration of the triumphal ride of Jesus into Jerusalem. Bouquets of white carnations were on the altar and white calla and Easter lilies were placed in the chancel, as were potted palms.

### Standard Oil Man Here Dies

Knute C. Swanson, chief engineer for the Standard Oil pumping station in Torrance, died suddenly last Thursday March 21 during a general safety meeting held by the Standard Oil at La Mirada. Heart trouble was given as the cause of his sudden death.

Mr. Swanson was 39 years old, and had an unusual service record with the Standard Oil, as he had been an employe for 24 years. He had been in Torrance for five years as chief engineer of their pumping station here.

He left a wife, Mrs. Norma A. Swanson, and a son, Henry Swanson.

Funeral services were held at the Stone and Myers chapel Monday afternoon. Interment was at Rosemead, where the Masonic order had charge of the services at the grave.
