

Glad Growers Win Prizes at Garden Club's Show on Monday; World Famous Expert Speaks

Carl Salbach of Berkeley, who is one of the greatest gladiolus authorities in the flower world, addressed the Torrance District Garden club Monday evening at the American Legion clubhouse.

There was a gladiolus display by members of the club, and judging was done by Mr. Salbach. He was assisted by Mrs. G. M. Verrall of Redondo Beach, florist and bulb grower.

C. B. Bell presided at the meeting in the absence of president John King, who is away on a vacation.

After the judging, Mr. Salbach spoke on gladiolus and gave the four things on which a gladiolus is judged. Color is the most important, he stated, and therefore is first on the list. Second is the height, third substance and fourth,

the spacing of the florets on the spike.

The value of smaller corms was stressed for various reasons. First they are lower in price, and although they produce smaller flowers the first year, they produce a much better corm the next year. Large corms deteriorate the first year, and smaller ones the second or third year.

He recommended the elimination of all stock showing real evidence of disease. He said the ruffled type of gladiolus is very good and reflects credit on the man who introduced it, Mr. Kindred of Goshen, Indiana.

Mr. Salbach also suggested that gladiolus be planted almost the year around although there is some danger of the frost stunting the plants.

He offered suggestions to winners of each class in the exhibition, as to how they might have obtained better blooms.

During the meeting \$40 was voted to buy a suitable trophy to be awarded by the Garden Club for the best display made by any Garden club at the Legion Flower show July 26-27.

Roy Herry made an offer to raise funds there to provide a trophy to be awarded at the same show to any service club, chamber of commerce or community.

Guests of the club Monday evening were the officers of the San Pedro Garden club.

Mr. Charles Briscoe, famous Dutch iris grower of Keystone, made a short talk about the bulb gardens he visited while enroute from Canada recently.

Class 1, 12 spikes large flowered varieties, one color but different shades: 1st, Mrs. Emma Hamlin and 2nd, Miss Mary Baldrick of Moneta.

Class 2-12 spikes large flowered varieties, mixed flowers: 1st, Mrs.

Lottie Fix.

Class 3-12 spikes one color, different shades, no entries.

Class 4-1 spike any red, dark red or scarlet large flowering variety: 1st and seconds awards, Mrs. A. H. Bartlett.

Class 5-1 spike any lavender or purple large flowering variety: 1st, Mrs. Lottie Fix; 2nd, Mrs. W. C. Hayden.

Class 6-1 spike any salmon, rose or pink large flowering variety: 1st, W. M. Pearson; 2nd, Mrs. A. H. Bartlett.

Class 7-1 spike any white, flesh, cream or buff large flowering variety: 1st, Miss Mary Baldrick of Moneta; 2nd, W. M. Pearson.

Class 8-1 spike any orange or yellow large flowering variety: 1st, Mrs. W. C. Hayden; 2nd, Mrs. Bruce Rocke.

Class 9-1 spike any other color large flowering variety: 1st, Mrs. O. H. Pearson.

Class 10-3 spikes one variety large flowered type: 1st, H. Weaver, San Pedro; 2nd, Roy Herry, Keystone.

Class 11-3 spikes one variety primulinus type: 1st, A. J. Fitzgerald of Lomita; 2nd, W. M. Pearson.

Class 12-1 spike red or orange primulinus variety: 1st, H. Weaver of San Pedro.

Class 13-1 spike any salmon, rose or pink primulinus: 1st, W. M. Pearson; 2nd, C. B. Bell.

Class 14-1 spike white or yellow primulinus: 1st, C. B. Bell; 2nd, Mrs. A. H. Bartlett.

Class 15-1 spike any flesh, cream or lavender primulinus, no entries.

Class 16-Most florets open on one spike: W. M. Pearson.

Class 17-Largest single floret in the exhibit: G. M. Verrall of Redondo Beach.
